Aliens in this country who took out declaration of intention papers previous to September 27th, 1906, and have not taken out final papers since that time, are now prohibited from doing so, according to a decision rendered on January 7th by the Supreme

Court of the United States. Under the previous ruling, those who had taken out the final papers any time after the required interval had elapsed. Notice of the new ruling has just been received by Circuit Court Clerk George Chastain.

ANCIENT INDIAN CITY FOUND

MADRID, Jan. 25.—News has been received here of the discovery in Brazil of the site of the Indian city known to early Spanish and Portuguese explorers as El Dorado, and hitherto regarded as legendary. The ruins are located in the Manoa region, near the Bolivian frontier, in the midst of a dense forest. An archaeological expedition, including Brazilian, Spanish and Portuguese scientists will make a detailed study of the district.
