WASHINGTON, D. C., March 7.—The president has nominated Bert F. Harvey of Portland as United States attorney for Oregon, to succeed Clarence Reams, who resigned recently. Harvey is a prominent democratic attorney. He also nominated Thomas Riggs Jr. of Alaska as governor of Alaska.

PETROGRAD, March 7.—The bolshevik leaders are prepared to withdraw even as far as the Ural mountains, rather than submit to the defeat of the revolution, Foreign Minister Trotsky declared in an interview with the Associated Press.

PRELIMINARY PEACE PACT IS SIGNED

ROUMANIA DREDS PART OF HER TERRITORY TO CENTRAL POWERS, AND AGREES TO HELP TRANSPORT THEIR TROOPS

AMSTERDAM, March 7.—Preliminary peace has been signed between Roumania and the central powers. Under the new terms Roumania cedes Dodrudja as far as the Danube, and undertakes to further the transportation of German troops to Odessa.

PIG KNITTERS FOUND IN SOUTH

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 7.—Coincident with a recent appeal from the Red Cross for more workers, there came to light here a sidelight on the views of women now giving many hours of their time each week toward those who put in plenty of time knitting for themselves. "Pig-knitters" is the designation coined by determined workers to designate those who are considered to be camouflaging their personal comfort under seemingly patriotic aspect. A "pig-knitter" is one who appears in public places devoted to the work for soldiers and toils for herself or her civilian friends, using up time and material which might make for the comfort of a man in the trenches.

LOCAL BOY LAID TO REST

Isaac Linsl, son of Charles Linsl, aged 14, years 7 months and 17 days, was buried March 4th. He was a native of Allidigger County, Alabama, came here with his folks in 1908, and has since resided in Klamath County. At the time of his death he was employed at Keller's cafe. The young man was sick only a very short time, and his death came as a very great shock to his relatives and friends. He leaves to mourn his death his father, Charles Linsl Sr., a prominent rancher; James Linsl, a logger at Round Lake, Edna Neubert, a sister who was with him at the time of his death; Charles Linsl, a brother who is with the service for this government.

LOCAL CHANGES NOTED

Several changes in and around Klamath Falls are noted by J. E. Enyart of Portland, whose last visit was made in the year 1890.
