Bulletins On Gardening Issued By Government

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 11—To instruct and guide the city dweller in making his back yard produce vegetable food, the United States Department of Agriculture has made ready for free distribution Farmers' Bulletin 926, "The City and Suburban Vegetable Garden."

The home garden movement of last year resulted, according to estimates cited by the Secretary of Agriculture, in the planting of from 200 to 300 per cent more gardens than ever before had produced food. Need for more food this year is expected to result in an even greater number of gardens.

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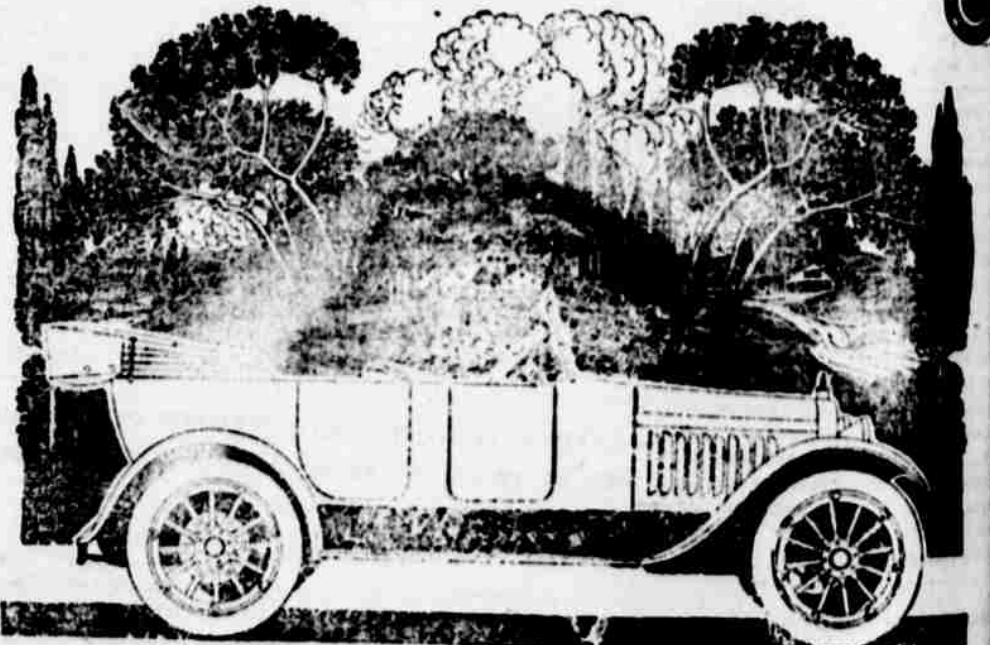
