BRIEF REVIEW OF REPUBLICAN ACHIEVEMENTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 1.—With the close of the special session of the Sixty-sixth Congress it is instructive to look back over the preceding six months and review the legislative record of the Republicans who have been in control of both houses for the first time since 1911. The first duty of the first Congress when it was called together by the President on May 19 was to enact the urgent supply bills to maintain the machinery of government. Seven of these great money measures had been left unacted upon when the Democrats surrendered the reins, and it became necessary to correct these mistakes of omission before a start on a legislative program could be made.

Within 28 legislative days all of those measures had been passed, and with a net savings to the country over the amounts carried in the corresponding bills for the preceding fiscal year of about \$940,000,000. Not only was this huge curtailment from the expenses of last year achieved, but the bills represented a reduction from the estimates submitted to Congress by the executive departments in the sum of more than \$1,685,000,000. Those estimates had not been predicated on war conditions; they were submitted after the signing of the armistice. That the Republicans refused to assent to them to the extent indicated does not mean that the reasonable needs of the government were not provided for. No just claim has been made that the appropriations will not be sufficient for the period for which they were made.

Not only have the Republicans achieved these huge economies in the use of the taxpayers' money, but many items of general legislation have been enacted that will prove of incalculable benefit to the country as a whole. Among those laws may be mentioned the return of the telegraph, telephone and cable lines to their owners; the woman suffrage constitutional amendment; the enactment of liberal provisions for the vocational training of wounded soldiers; the incorporation of the American Legion; additional compensation for postal employees; more stringent restrictions governing immigration; several laws facilitating the reclamation and development of the public domain of the west; extension of food control act with added penalties for profiteering; increase in the allowances for certain classes of injury under the war risk act, and others.

While the Senate has been engaged most of the time in the consideration of the peace treaty, the successful adoption of reservations to which is by far the greatest achievement of the session, it has found time to co-operate in the passage of the measures enumerated, and has given consideration in committee to many others that will receive early attention when Congress reconvenes on December 1. The most important is the railroad bill now on the Senate calendar of business. Merchant marine legislation has been in course of preparation by the commerce committee, measures dealing with phases of the tariff are ready for report by the committee on finance, and the army reorganization bill has been thoroughly investigated by the military committee. All those matters will receive early attention in the next session.

The house has passed a number of other measures which but need the approval of the Senate to become laws. Among them is a railroad bill; a comprehensive merchant marine measure; a budget bill; an oil, gas and coal-land leasing bill, and a water power bill. Other equally important measures have been reported from House committees and await early action. To quote Republican Leader Mondell of the House, "It can be truthfully said that no Congress in American history has more correspondingly, consistently and

continuously addressed itself to or more faithfully performed and discharged the duties and responsibilities placed upon it than the special session of the Sixty-sixth Congress."
