Columbia Flood Still on; \$4,000 Last Crop Damage

PORTLAND, June 6.—Flood waters, seeping through gopher holes, last night inundated a valuable garden tract at Hood River causing a \$4000 loss. The Columbia river's stage here today, by weather bureau forecast, is 22.9 feet, against 24.7 Thursday. Upper Columbia river points reported a sharp rise, Wenatchee reporting 1.2 feet. The Snake is up 1.2 feet at Lewiston to the 25 foot stage, which would bring the water to Front street here.
