Conclusive arguments for the need of development of the Coos Bay harbor is contained in a memorial to congress just completed by the Marshfield chamber of commerce. The booklets have been distributed among the members of congress, to enlist their aid in securing the rebuilding of the north jetty, construction of the south jetty and deepening of inner channel of the harbor.

Says Japanese Will Control Hawaii if Labor Bar Persists

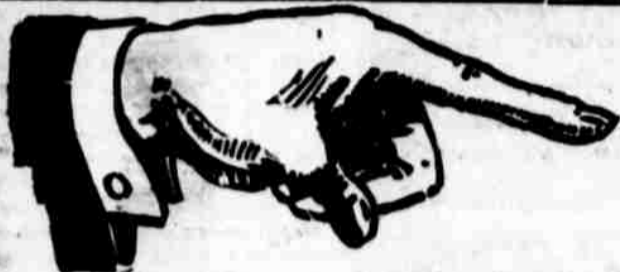
