The State of Oregon, in relation to the Warren Construction Co., vs. Tillamook City, the Supreme Court issued a mandamus directing the city council to call a meeting and levy a tax to pay, \$16,719.45 for the sewer system on all the taxable property of the city, or show cause within ten days why they have not done so.

The defendant contracted for ten tons of fertilizer at the agreed price of \$42.00 per ton, and on the 7th of March 1911, five and three ninth tons were delivered to defendant at Houlton, in the state of Maine, and to recover the above amount the plaintiff now sues for.

Council Meeting.

On Monday evening the city council met in regular session with the following officers present:

Mayor Beals; Councilmen, Brodhead, Melchior, Edmunds, Lamb and Keldson; Recorder Aschim; Attorney Botts and Marshal Myers.

An order was served on the council by the Supreme Court of the State asking that the council levy a sufficient tax to pay the amount owed for the storm sewer which amounts to \$16,719.45 or show cause in ten days why the amount should not be paid. We understand that the city officials will give this matter careful consideration and see to it that the interests of the city are protected in every way. The storm sewer indebtedness has always been considered legitimate, and no doubt would have been paid before, but there has never been but a small amount to apply on the same at any one time and for that reason nothing has been done. The power to issue bonds which was voted on and carried at the last special election was supposed to enable the council to take care of this indebtedness, and it probably will if the market for bonds continue to improve. Up until the last week or so there has been no market for bonds, but lately conditions seem to have improved.

Prof. Johnson on the War and Bible Prophecy.

The meeting at the Seventh day Adventist Church are continuing with an apparently growing interest. The church is filled each evening and the best of attention is being paid.

Sunday evening Mr. Johnson, the lecturer, proved from the Bible that Turkey, under the title of the King of the north (Dan 11), after a career of furious destruction, which all agree has been fulfilled shall move his capital from Constantinople (Dan 11:45), and as the Turks themselves say "Go to Jerusalem." According to their prophecy, Turkey will not receive help as has been given in the past by England, France, etc., as against Russia, but shall "Come to his end and none shall help him."

From another line of prophecy (Rev. 16), Prof. Johnson showed that before Turkey came to his end, five of the seven last plagues will fall. These do not begin to fall until after probation closes. And when probation closes Christ or Michael stands up or rules (Dan. 12:1).

Under the sixth plague, Turkey, under the Symbol of the "River Euphrates" is dried up (Rev. 16:12) that is the process of evaporation is finished. An editorial from a very recent copy of the Oregonian was read, which showed that this work of drying up has been going on for a long time and is nearly completed, the recent Balkan war leaving but a very narrow strip of Turkey in Europe.

A quotation from Premier Asquith, of England said that Turkey has "dug his own grave and committed suicide" How much longer will he be allowed to continue to exist?

The same prophecy (Rev. 16), says that the ways of the Kings of the east will be prepared by Turkey being dried up or removed, and one of the kings of the east, Japan, is being invited to come west to help to destroy Turkey. The probability is that Japan will go to Egypt and thus be ready for the final battle, "The Battle of Armageddon." (Rev. 16:14).

The allies propose to give the Japanese a free hand in China to repay the Japanese for their help to the allies. Will the U. S. allow that? The U. S. is one of the Kings of the East by virtue of the Philippines and proposes to maintain the open door as well as the integrity of China. Is not our way "being prepared" to enter the fight when the final great religious war is declared, as Turkey says when all the nations will try to take Jerusalem from them?

All this cannot happen until after the close of probation, as is indicated by the falling of the first of the seven last plagues, and none of the plagues can fall until the time for character building closes. (Rev. 22: 11 & 12).

In view of the fact that it is evident that Turkey must soon be disposed of finally, with all that that means, i. e., the gathering of all the nations at Jerusalem for the final battle of the ages, and their final destruction by the presence of Christ, the question is: Are we ready?
