An Old Pioneer

Passes Away

John Jonsson a Tillamook County
Citizen Since 1872, Passed Away
At Garibaldi Sunday.

John Jonsson, one of our most respected citizens, and who has been a citizen of the county since 1872, passed away at his home at Garibaldi last Monday night. He was in excellent health when he retired that night, but when he was called in the morning it was discovered he was dead.

The funeral services were held at the home on January 2, and were conducted by Rev. Kiehl of Bay City. The services at the grave were conducted by the G. A. R. of which he was a member. Interment took place at the Bay View Cemetery.

Deceased had lived on the same farm from the time he came to the county.

Obituary.

John Jonsson, was born in the state of New York, March 27, 1830, died December 31st, 1912, at the age of 82 years 9 months and 4 days. His father was a sea captain, and died in Germany, when the subject of this sketch was only 13 years old. After the death of his father, he lived with his uncle at Vin Du Lac, Wisconsin, until 1852 when he crossed the plains and arrived at Marysville, California, after a journey of over six months. In 1854 he was a member of the vigilance committee of San Francisco. He followed mining in California for a number of years, and came to Portland in the winter of 1861, and remained there until 1871. He enlisted in Company B, First Oregon Infantry, and served under Capt. Powell on the frontier, and at Fort Hall, Idaho, being honorably discharged after a service of 18 months. He belonged to the North Post G. A. R. of Tillamook, and married Mary Rose, a native of

New York state, and came to Tillamook County the same year and settled on the old homestead where he has lived to the time of his death. Only one child was born of this union, a son, Charles A. Johnson, who now lives in Tillamook City.

NO TRAINS FOR TWO WEEKS.

The last report which we received this morning was to the effect that there would be no more trains between Portland and Tillamook for at least another two weeks.

The bad slide the other side of Bay City has been cleared away, but there are many other slides beyond Mohler. Between Enright and Timber the road is in very bad condition. A large steam shovel from Canby is expected to begin work from the other end today.
