We understand that Tillamook County is the first county in Oregon that has asked for space in the Oregon building at the San Francisco Fair in 1915. This fact in itself will show to the world that we are not asleep, but are about to take our place among the leading localities of the Northwest.

A new white slave trick has lately been discovered. ## BANDON MOOSE PLAN HALL.

The Bandon lodge of Moose has formed a building society and plans to erect a large hall. The cost of the building is estimated at \$25,000. It will be heated by steam. In the basement will be a swimming pool containing salt water. To facilitate obtaining the salt water the building will be erected on a sandy stretch of beach which is not more than 100 feet from the City Hall.

## A SERIOUS SHOOTING

It seems that the Doerge boy went up stairs and secured a loaded revolver and shot it off, the bullet passing over the head of a man passing, he then turned the empty barrel on the Thayer boy and snapped the trigger after which he passed the revolver which he had sucked to the Thayer boy who accidentally pulled the trigger on a loaded barrel while the gun was pointed towards the Doerge boy, shooting the Doerge boy through the abdomen.

The injured boy is still alive at this writing, and it is thought he may live, but the chances are against him. The boys were alone at the time of the shooting, the family being at the Bosquet ranch. The doctor was called immediately, however, and the father was on the scene in 15 minutes.
