the outcome of the fall elections to

H. M. Farmer, the one a Democrat
and the other a Republican, are
practically assured of the nomina-
tion—and then the fun begins.)

denial of being connected in any way

"Asleep-at-the-switch" Hawley cir-
culated the vote this week with a
mildly worded letter (printed in Wash-
ington) telling his good friends here
how much money he had secured for
the buildings of roads at CRATER
LAKE and also the amount he had
secured for the improvement of Tilla-

well-meaning members just when this
improvement money was secured,
but that we doubt him but that
it looks like we were in dire need
of a considerable "harbor appropria-
tion" last now. But when he says
