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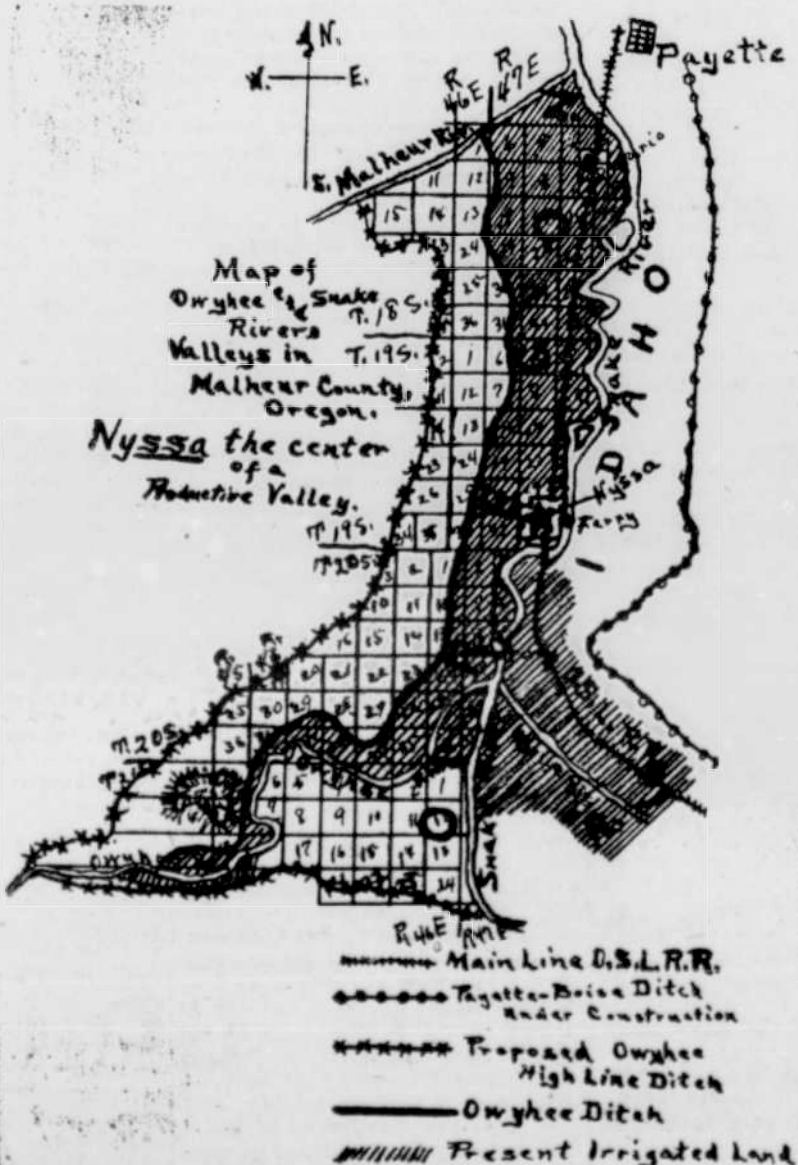
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SQUIRRELS FORETELL WEATHER.

NOTICE OF AN ELECTION

For the purpose of determining a boundary line between the state of Oregon and the state of Idaho, the act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, approved February 20, 1905, Chapter V of Title XXXIX of Ballinger & Colton's Annotated Codes and Statutes of Oregon, and Amendments thereto, is hereby given.

Notice is hereby given that the County Court of the state of Oregon for the County of Malheur, on the 28th day of March, 1910, made an order establishing the proposed Klamath Colony Irrigation District, the boundaries of which are as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at a point opposite the mouth of the south channel of the Owyhee river where the boundary line between the state of Oregon and the state of Idaho intersects the mid-channel of Snake river; thence westerly along the mid-channel of the Owyhee river to a point where the range line between ranges 45 and 46 E. of the W. 31, intersects the Owyhee river on the west line of sec. 15, Twp. 21 S., R. 46 E.; thence south along said range line to the west quarter corner on the west line of sec. 19, Twp. 21 S., R. 46 E.; thence east along the center line of said section to the quarter corner on the east line of said sec. 19; thence north along the section line to the quarter corner on the west line of sec. 17; thence east to the center of said sec. 17; thence south to the SW cor. of the NW 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of said section; thence east to the SW cor. of the NW 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of sec. 15; thence south along the section line to the SE cor. of the NE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of sec. 28; thence west to the SW cor. of said NE 1/4 of SE 1/4; thence south to the SW cor. of the SW 1/4 of said sec. 28; thence south to the SW cor. of the SE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 33; thence east to the center of said sec. 33; thence south to the SE cor. of the NE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 4, Twp. 22 S., R. 46 E.; thence west to the SW cor. of said NE 1/4 of NW 1/4; thence south to the SW cor. of the NE 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of sec. 9; thence east to the SE cor. of said NE 1/4 of SW 1/4; thence south to the quarter corner on the south line of said sec. 9; thence east to the NW cor. of the NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of sec. 16; thence south to the SW cor. of said NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4; thence east to the SE cor. of the NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4; thence south to the SE cor. of the SE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 22; thence east to the NE cor. of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 22; thence south to the SE cor. of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 22; thence east to the NE cor. of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 22; thence south to the center of said section; thence east to the NE cor. of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 2; thence west to the SW cor. of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 2; thence south to the quarter corner on the south line of said sec. 22; thence west to the SW cor. of said section; thence south along the section line to the quarter corner on the west line of sec. 27; thence east to the SW cor. of the SE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of said sec. 27; thence north to the NW cor. of said SE 1/4 of the NW 1/4; thence east to the NE cor. of the SW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of said section; thence south to the SW cor. of the NE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of said section; thence east to the SE cor. of said section; thence south to the SE cor. of the SE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of sec. 11; thence north to the NW cor. of the NE 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of said section; thence west to the SW cor. of the SE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of sec. 3; thence south to the SW cor. of the SE 1/4 of the SE cor. of the SE 1/4 of said section; thence east to the SE cor. of said sec. 11; thence south along the section line to the SW cor. of the NW 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of sec. 13; thence east to the SE cor. of the NW 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of said sec. 13; thence north to the NE cor. of said NW 1/4 of the SE 1/4; thence east to the state boundary line on the east side of sec. 18; thence north along the boundary line between the state of Idaho and the state of Oregon to the intersection of said line with the mid-channel of Snake river; thence down the mid-channel of Snake river to place of beginning in Malheur County, Oregon.

Notice is further given that said Court, in said order designated and named said District the "Klamath Colony Irrigation District", and for the purpose of determining whether or not the said proposed irrigation district shall be organized under the provisions of Chapter V of Title XXXIX of Ballinger & Colton's Annotated Codes and Statutes of Oregon, the same being an act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, approved February 20th, 1905, and as to amendments thereto, an election will be held at the ranch house of W. Lee Blodgett on the NW 1/4 of Sec. 19, Township 21 S., R. 46 E., W. 31, in said District on the 14th day of May, 1910, which said election will be held and conducted as nearly as practicable with the general laws of the State of Oregon, provided that no particular form of ballot shall not apply. At said election the electors shall cast ballots which shall contain the words "Irrigation District—Yes", or "Irrigation District—No", or word equivalent thereto, and said ballots shall also contain in the names of the persons to be voted for in the various elective offices described in said act above mentioned, namely, an Assessor, a Collector, a Treasurer, and five Directors for said proposed Irrigation District.

That the following persons have been appointed judges of said election: W. H. Pinkston, A. E. Wade, and W. W. Smith; and the following persons have been appointed clerks of said election: R. R. Overstreet, C. R. Beaumont, and A. E. Jones.

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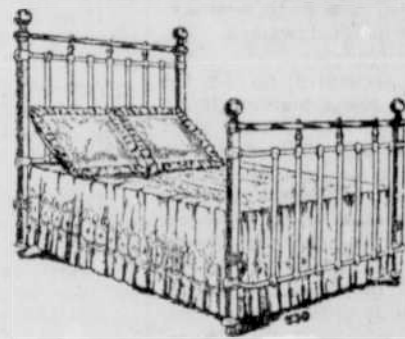
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
