
# A Terrible Fire in A Newspaper Office Causes Many Deaths---Compositors on the Fifth Floor and no Means of Egress.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., March 7 .--The Daily Union newspaper office burned this afternoon. It is known that sixteen or eighteen people have been burned to death or killed. The fire which is still raging threatens to be a big one. The flames in the Union office spread so rapidly that only a few people of those in the upper stories escaped. Mrs. Farley, society editor, was instantly killed by jumping from an upper window. The composing room was on the 200 fifth floor and the inmates were shut The same being one delegate at out from any means of escape. A dozen men ran to the windows and hung suspended by their hands until their strength gave way, when last they dropped to the sidewalk and were either killed or fatally injured. There were forty persons in the editorial room, and twenty are missing, hut it is hoped they escaped.

Spreckels' Laudable Ambition,

NEW YORK, March 7 .-- Claus Spreckels in an interview to-day regarding the proposed refinery said: This is no bluff. In my old age I have but one ambition. I wish to give employment to enough workmen to keep the \$50,000,000 or sothat is annually spent abroad for sugar, in this country. I have not entered into this for gain solely. When I decide on a location, which will be in a few weeks at the most, I shall put a large force at work and shall begin refining sugar within a year of this time in this vicinity. Then we shall see whether the trust can ruin me. In a few years there will be from ten to fifteen beet sugar factories in operation on the Pacific Coast. But before that time I shall be turning out 8000 pounds of sugar daily from my refinery in the East.

More of the Strike.

MINNEAPOLIS, March 7.-The strike of engineers on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy road has extended to the Burlington & Northern, All Brotherhood engineers and firemen left their engines at 10 o'clock this morning. The effect has not yet been observed, because the road does not send out passenger trains till 4:15 p. m. At that time the officials claim the express will start as usual, while the Brotherhood claim that the road will not be able to move a wheel. The strike affects about one handred men.
