It is the aim of the republican party to promote temperance, morality and all the higher attributes of mankind, and to that end it has always given a respectful ear to the demands of the most radical moral reformers within its ranks; and today, it is the only party in which the underlying principles of prohibition have the slightest sympathy.

TAXATION.

The present system of raising revenue for state purposes makes it imperative upon assessors and County Boards of equalization to study the values placed upon property by other assessors, else one county may pay more than its just proportion of the state tax.

Each county should make its levy independently of the others. The state tax should be determined, not by a levy of so many mills on all the property of the state, but rather, each county should be required to pay a specified sum.

That an equitable adjustment of values may be secured, a State Board of Equalization should be created, with power to raise and lower for state purposes only, the assessed values of the different classes of property.

By this system, it would not concern any assessor to know the values adopted by the assessors of other counties, and a fair and just assessment of all property would likely result.

That part of the present law which exempts indebtedness from the value of taxable property should, undoubtedly, be repealed.
