**Bank Officers in Raleigh, N. C. Abscond** with the Funds.

**LOVED NOT WISELY BUT TOO WELL.**  
A Seattle Man Arrested in Vermont for Bigamy.

ST. ALBANS (Vt.), March 27.—B. A. Hall, of Seattle, W. T., was arrested here yesterday for bigamy. Hall left his wife in Seattle and came here last January, and went into business. Ten weeks ago he married a pretty young girl living near here, who subsequently became acquainted that her connubial relation was claimed by another. Hall is held for trial, and his Seattle wife will be brought here to appear against him.

**The Storm Still Raging.**  
DULUTH, March 27th.—The storm in northern Wisconsin and Minnesota still continues. Trains are from fifteen to forty hours late. The cuts on all the railroads are in a bad shape, and crowds of men and many snow plows are at work making a passage for trains.

**A Journalist Suicides.**  
SALT LAKE, March 27.—E. G. Wellman, formerly local editor of the Leadville Herald, and at one time connected with the Denver Times, suicided here yesterday by taking morphine. He was 30 years of age.

**Convicts Mutiny.**  
BIRMINGHAM (Ala.), Mar. 27th.—Twenty-five convicts mutinied at the prison here yesterday, and the officers in attempting to suppress the uprising, killed two of the Monroe convicts. The coroner's jury rendered a verdict that the shooting was done in the performance of the prison officers' duty.

**Terrible Rain Storm.**  
MONTGOMERY (Ala.), March 27.—A tremendous rain storm prevailed all over Alabama last night. The Warrior and Coosa rivers rose 20 feet, and are still rising a foot an hour.

**Absconded with the Funds.**  
RALEIGH (N. C.), March 27.—The directors of the State National bank, having reason to believe that the president and cashier of the bank have absconded with a large amount of its assets, to-day closed the doors of the bank, and turned over all its affairs to officers of the United States government.

**Russian Aggression.**  
LONDON, Mar. 27—A letter from St. Petersburg to the Morning Post confirms the reports of the continued hostile massing of Russian troops on the Polish frontier.

**Memorial Church.**  
BERLIN, Mar. 27—The North German Gazette suggests, as a suitable monument to the late Emperor, the erection of a magnificent memorial church, fronted by an equestrian statue of Emperor William.

**Crushed to Death.**  
PORTLAND (Or.), March 27th—William Busler was crushed to death this morning, at 9:30 o'clock, in the rock quarry on the corner of Clay and Seventeenth Sts. He fell from a loaded wagon, which passed over his body, and he died in half an hour.

**Victoria at Leghona.**  
ROME, March 27.—It is reported that the Queen of England will witness a review of Italian and English men-of-war at Leghona.

### Governor Dorsheimer Dead.

NEW YORK, March 27.—Ex-Lieut. Governor William B. Dorsheimer, publisher of the Star, died last night.

### TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

Another storm is reported in various parts of the northwest. On Sunday a severe sleet storm prevailed, and great damage to wheat and fruit is feared.

Congressman Mills, of Texas, was quite ill last evening. His condition is not considered critical, but it has been deemed advisable to exclude all visitors from his sick room.

The woman suffragists are in council in Washington, D. C., with Susan B. Anthony as president, and Elizabeth Cady Stanton the principal speaker. Upwards of one hundred delegates are in attendance, England, Ireland, France, Canada, British India, and Finland being represented.

### MORNING TELEGRAMS.

Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.

### THREE TRAINS DISABLED.

A Bad Smash-up at Truckee, California; but no one injured.

TRUCKEE (Cal.), March 26.—This morning at 3:30 freight train No. 5 had two cars thrown from the track, half a mile east of Union Mills side track, caused by the breaking of a journal. Train No. 1 passed the wreck safely on the side track, but No. 2 had heavy engines from the Salt Lake division. The second engine jumped the track at the switch, and plowed through the main track, breaking the steel rails. The mail and express cars followed, and a piece of steel rail nine feet long was driven up through the express car. The Truckee wrecking train was working at the No. 5 wreck when the second accident occurred, and was wedged in on the side-track between the two wrecks. The Wadsworth wrecking train was telegraphed for, and is now clearing the wreck. The mail was transferred, and the mail car and engine were abandoned. The express car was drawn back on the side-track and repaired. Train No. 2 passed here at 5 p. m. The engine was considerably damaged and the passengers badly frightened, but no one was hurt.

### Huntington Outwitted.

LOUISVILLE, March 26.—A minority of the stockholders of the Louisville Short Route Railway Transfer Company are jubilant over their success in outwitting Huntington and other big stockholders in the recent fight. When a transfer of one million dollars worth of stock was made recently by General Echols and Wire, the local stockholders claimed such proceeding was for the purpose of freezing them out. They drafted a bill amending the Short Route charter, and providing that all the offices and books shall be kept in this city, and that nine directors, residents of Kentucky, shall be elected yearly, and that each director shall hold at least twenty shares of stock. The bill passed the senate and the house before the Huntington people knew anything about it. The Huntington people petitioned the governor to veto the measure which he refused to do.

### Meeting Suppressed.

DUBLIN, March 26.—Wm. O'Brien addressed the Pensonby tenants at Youghal this morning, and afterwards attempted to hold a meeting proclaimed by the government. He mounted a car, with the intention of addressing the people, but was seized by policemen and dragged to the ground. The police then charged the crowd with batons, and a serious melee ensued, in which a number on both sides were wounded. It is alleged that several police were stabbed. O'Brien escaped to a priest's house, and subsequently harangued the crowd in a stable. Police and soldiers are parading the streets.
