LATEST DISPATCHES.

Murder Rampant in New York—A List of Some of the Victims. FATAL BOILER EXPLOSION. Steamer Bob Irwin Blown to Pieces and Several Lives Lost.

MT. VERNON, N. Y. April 2.—The steamer Bob Irwin, whose boiler exploded yesterday, killing the captain and fireman, was blown into kindling wood. The vessel was entering shallow water at the time of the explosion. It is supposed the water had been allowed to run low in the boiler, and that immediately cold water was pumped in, the explosion occurred. The fireman's body could not be found, and it is believed he was blown to pieces. The remains of the captain in almost an unrecognizable condition, were found on the wreck. The boilers were ripped from end to end.

Murder Rampant. NEW YORK April 2.—Just at the present murder is rampant in this city. Before day break this morning an Italian named Guanneno Conte was found lying dead on the floor of his room in a basement, with deep cuts on him which showed the manner of his death. Patrick Haukenham slashed his wife to death with a razor in the basement of a house. He was intoxicated at the time. Carrie Hein, aged 47 years, was found dead with her skull fractured. Clubbed to Death. SAN FRANCISCO, April 2.—Wm. Martin died yesterday from the effects of a clubbing given him by policeman Charles O'Neil a few days ago. The latter in arresting Martin for stabbing a man named Goldstein, was himself cut by Martin, and fearing that his life was in danger, O'Neil clubbed Martin over the head, with the result as above stated.

The War in Abyssinia. MASSOWAH, April 2.—King John has sent a letter to General San Marzeni, saying he cannot conclude peace upon the conditions proposed by the Italians. The probabilities are that further negotiations will be held.

Will Fight it Out. PITTSBURG, April 2.—Representatives of all the lodges of the brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, met yesterday and agreed to support the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy strikers throughout the whole trouble.

University Concert. The concert at the University Chapel next Wednesday evening promises to be a musical event. Besides the choruses by the University Choral Club, Misses Jones, Parrish, and Gillingham, Messrs. Sears and Bagley, and others will assist. The exhibition of the Anthophone, a new kind of musical instrument, will have its first exhibition in Salem at this time.

Getting Ready to Liquidate. Next Thursday State Treasurer Webb will issue his 31st notice, calling in all outstanding warrants, which have been presented and not paid for want of funds. They amount to about \$72,000.

TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

Dr. W. Bisset, the arctic explorer, died in Berlin yesterday. The senate to-day passed the house bill granting a pension to Mrs. General Logan. The senate has confirmed the nomination of John Myers, United States marshal for Oregon. A postoffice has been established at Eagle, Shoshone county, Idaho, and A. A. Weber appointed postmaster.

The international council of women, which has been in session several days in Washington, closes its session this afternoon. The Icelandic Educational Society of Winnipeg, Manitoba, has addressed a memorial to congress, asking that congress recognize Lieftrin Eriesson as the discoverer of America. The residence of Congressman William Walter Phelps, two miles from Englewood, N. J., was destroyed yesterday by an explosion of illuminating gas in the art gallery. Loss \$150,000. A heavy wind on Friday night caused an accident to the Merchants' dry dock, San Francisco. A hole was knocked in one of the boats, causing it to fill with water and sink. The damage will be temporary. A rumor is current in San Francisco that S. B. Armour, elder brother of the pork king of Chicago, intends establishing a packing house in that city. The presence of Mr. Armour in Pescadero, fifty miles from San Francisco, gives currency to the rumor. Saturday afternoon while Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Tash were entering Sacramento from their farm, their team ran away and threw them out. They were coming in to have their baby baptized. The child, who was nearly two month old, was struck on the head and was almost instantly killed.

CALL FOR REPUBLICAN CONVENTION. A republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet at the city of Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 11th day of April, A. D. 1888, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following officers, to-wit: Representative in congress, three presidential electors, supreme judge and district officers, and to select six delegates to attend the national republican convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 209 delegates, apportioned among the several counties as follows:

Baker 5, Benton 5, Clackamas 9, Clatsop 7, Columbia 4, Coos 7, Crook 3, Curry 3, Douglas 9, Gilliam 5, Grant 6, Jackson 7, Josephine 4, Klamath 3, Lake 2, Lane 10, Linn 10, Malheur 2, Marion 14, Morrow 5, Multnomah 30, Polk 6, Tillamook 3, Umatilla 10, Union 8, Wallowa 4, Wasco 4, Washington 8, Yamhill 9. Total 209.

The same being one delegate at large from each county and one delegate for every 150 voters and one for every fraction over one-half thereof, cast for Hon. Binger Hermann, congressman, at the last general election. The committee recommend that the primaries be held March 31, 1888, and the county conventions April 4, 1888, unless otherwise ordered by the county central committee. Republican electors and voters of the state, without regard to past political affiliations, who believe in the American principle of protective tariff and dignifying American labor, giving free, popular education to the masses of the people, effectually protecting all human rights in every section of our common country, and who desire to promote friendly feeling and permanent harmony throughout the state by maintaining a government pledged to these objects and principles, are cordially invited to unite in selecting delegates to the republican state convention. MORNING TELEGRAMS.

Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing. THE RAILROADMEN'S STRIKE. The Trouble Over Handling "Q" Cars Still Extending.

KANSAS CITY, April 1.—Switch engineers and firemen of all roads entering the city except the Burlington, held a meeting late last night, at which they resolved that after 12 o'clock, noon, Monday they would refuse to handle any Burlington cars of freight except it be live stock or perishable freight, which had been started previous to that hour. A committee called on the superintendents to-day and notified them of the order. If road engineers are put in yards to do switching, or new men are hired in their places, then switchmen will refuse to work. Managers of the lines have not yet made known what they will do, but it is presumed they will attempt to handle the freight.

STILL ANOTHER DEMAND. MILWAUKEE, April 1.—Switchmen of the St. Paul company, in this city, have formulated a demand to be presented Gen. Roswell Miller, that no "Q" freight shall be handled by the road under any circumstances. In the event that the demand is not complied with, they will quit work at 11 o'clock to-morrow.

ONE MORE STRIKE. ST. JOSEPH, April 1.—All freight brakemen on the Kansas City, St. Joseph and Council Bluffs railroad struck to-day. They assign as a reason the danger of their lives in working with "seab engineers." This makes 500 strikers now in the city.

Caskey's Confession. SAN FRANCISCO, April 1.—The confession of Mate Caskey and Steward Bachman, of the bark Brussels, which was almost totally destroyed by fire in the stream on the morning of March 9th, that the vessel was deliberately set on fire by Bachman, who was induced to do so by her Captain, has created a decided sensation in marine circles. The district attorney will to-morrow lay the whole matter before the grand jury.

Attempted Jail Break. CHARLESTON, (Mo.), April 1.—Three prisoners confined in the jail here made an unsuccessful attempt to escape last night. They started a fire against the door of their cell, hoping to expand the metal door until it should burst its fastenings. The light of the fire was discovered and the game stopped, but not before they were almost suffocated with the smoke. One of the parties is in for burglary and the other two for minor offenses.

Special Train Wrecked. BALTIMORE, April 1.—A special legislative train on the Annapolis Short Line Railway was wrecked this afternoon at Revels. Senator Adams and several members of the House of Delegates were injured.
