LATEST DISPATCHES.

The Dominion Government Wants Commer- cial Relations With the U. S.

DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION. The Business Finished up and the Del- egates Disperse.

PENDLETON, Apr. 4.—The nomi- nations were further proceeded with to-day, by the unanimous choice of Judge Burnett, of Benton, for su- preme judge. Next the delegates to the national convention in St. Louis were nominated. A score of names were put up, and the six who receiv- ed the highest votes were chosen. They are as follows: Gen. John A. Miller, of Klamath; Napoleon Davis, of Washington; T. J. Black, of Linn; Col. J. Kelly, of Multnomah; M. T. Hellman, of Grant; and H. Klippel, of Jackson. The alternates are Messrs. Richardson, Fenton, Savage, Wisdom, Page, and Bush.

The presidential electors are W. H. Effinger, of Multnomah; W. R. Bil- yeu, of Linn; and John C. Drain, of Douglas.

A. Bush, of Marion, was elected chairman of the state central com- mittee, defeating B. Killin, of Mult- nomah. The Multnomah delegates felt themselves sat down on.

The resolutions in favor of Cleveland's free trade recommendations, free wool and all, otherwise they are dis- creet and merely routine. The con- vention adjourned late in the after- noon, and the 8 o'clock p. m. train carried away most of the delegates.

Commercial Reciprocity. OTTAWA, (Ont.), April 5.—Sir Charles Tupper, Minister of Finance, in answer to a question in the House of Commons to-day, said the retali- atory bill introduced in the U. S. Congress was the result of a misun- derstanding in that country. He added that in the next official gazette there would appear a proclamation providing for free interchange of products be- tween the two countries. This an- nouncement has created a sensation in political circles, and is regarded as a complete back-down on the part of the Dominion government, especially in view of the declaration made last week by cabinet minis- ters that Canada would maintain its interpretation of international arrange- ments at all hazards.

The Fisheries Treaty. WASHINGTON, April 5.—The fisheries treaty will be called up in the committee on foreign affairs on Saturday. At the present time there are two lines of action being discussed; one is to have the com- mittee report the reasons for ex- pressing the opinion of the senate that the treaty is unsatisfactory, and should not be ratified; the other is to refer it back to the state department with the suggestion that it be amended in certain particulars.

Sacred War Proclaimed. CAIRO, April 5.—The Khedive has received a copy of the procla- mation issued by the mahdi, declar- ing sacred war against Egypt, and ordering the Soudanese to enter her territory. To this is attributed the renewal of hostilities near Suakin by Osman Digna, and the alarming reports of movements in the interior.

Commissioner Appointed. WASHINGTON, Apr. 5.—Frank Mc Coppin, of San Francisco has ac- cepted the president's appointment of chief commissioner from the United States to the Australian ex- position, which opens at Melbourne a few months hence.

CALL FOR REPUBLICAN CONVENTION. A republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet at the city of Portland, Oregon, on Wednesday, the 11th day of April, A. D. 1888, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating can- didates for the following officers, to-wit: Representative in congress, three presidential electors, supreme judge and district officers, and to select six delegates to attend the national republican convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 209 delegates, apportion- ed among the several counties as follows:

The same being one delegate at large from each county and one delegate for every 150 voters and one for every fraction over one-half thereof, cast for Hon. Binger Her- mann, congressman, at the last general election. The committee recommend that the primaries be held March 31, 1888, and the county conventions April 4, 1888, unless otherwise ordered by the county central committee.

MORNING TELEGRAMS.

Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.

OREGON POLITICS. What Senator Mitchell Has to Say of the Outlook.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Senator Mitchell was interviewed to-day. "What do you hear about the interference of the administration in Oregon politics?" he was asked.

"Very little," was the Senator's reply. "I have no doubt but what the President was interested in en- rolling one more state on the list of those that at present fill the demo- cratic column. I have received letters from San Francisco saying that Jno. Irish was going to Oregon to stump the state for the adminis- tration. As Irish was in Washing- ton and saw the President, I pre- sume they must have come to some sort of an understanding regarding Pacific Coast politics. There have been some suggestions that Jno. F. Swift ought to go into the state to canvas for the republicans, but I don't know what truth there is in the rumor. Great dissatisfaction exists in Oregon in regard to the tariff policy of the President. I have received personal letters from many democratic friends saying that if Cleveland was again a candi- date he would lose at least 1000 democratic votes in Oregon."

"How about the state election?" asked your correspondent.

"I am not so sure about it," was the answer. "The hostility toward the President might not have so much effect in the state election. When it comes to the Presidential election many democrats will not vote for him. I am confident the republicans will carry the state election in June, and if our national convention nominates a man who is right on the Chinese tariff and money questions we will be success- ful in the Presidential contest. On the tariff the President's message is aimed against three of our principal industries, wool, lead and lumber. Oregon produced 15,000,000 pounds of wool this year for shipment, and it is proposed to sacrifice this indus- try to foreign competition, besides our people have not forgotten that last year Cleveland pocketed a river and harbor bill of only nine millions that contained appropriations ag- gregating \$600,000 for Oregon."

Secession Movement. OTTAWA, April 4.—Advices from Nova Scotia and Newfoundland state that the secession movement in the province and the anti-confeder- ation movement in the colonies have developed unexpected strength. The Government has been warned not to trifle with either agitation.

The aim of the secessionists and an- nexationist members is to form a separate confederation of the marit- ime provinces, bring Newfoundland into it, and then go in a body to the United States, leaving the remain- ing provinces to shift for themselves, without a single open Atlantic port five months in the year.

Prohibition Convention. SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 4.—The State Prohibition Convention com- menced here this morning. After the religious services were concluded, the convention spent nearly two hours in the election of a temporary Chairman. The proceed- ings throughout were extremely boi- sterous, it being apparent that the delegates were divided into a num- ber of factions.

Ex-Governor St. John, of Kansas, addressed the convention in the af- ternoon.

Hermann Favored in Baker. BAKER CITY, April 4.—The Baker county delegates to the state con- vention have been instructed to vote for Hermann for Congress.

In Phoenix, A. T., last evening the adobe house of David Bewley fell in, burying with him his son and daughter. The first and last re- ported dead, and the boy will probably die.
