INTEMPERATE ZEAL.

The Statesman this morning, copying our report of a recent meeting of the prohibition club in the rooms of the W. C. T. U., appends the following remarks.

This is a complete list of the committee, and this flimsy excuse for a man named Gaylord is chairman of all but one, and a member of that one, and an imported fellow called "Dr." Wyatt seems to be the next highest in authority.

We submit to our adolescent friend, the editor of the Statesman, whether such unmerited abuse of unoffending citizens is in the public interest. An effort is now being made by the people of Salem to attract immigration to this city and locality, and any honest, deserving person who casts in his lot among us, is an aid to the object all are striving for.

The "imported fellow" named in the above article, "Dr." Wyatt, (with the invidious use of inverted commas) came here with his family a few months ago, is a householder and a taxpayer, and is successfully practicing the medical profession.

The other victim, crucified in the types, N. R. Gaylord, is an honest and skillful mechanic, who earns his living by repairing sewing machines and tuning pianos.

The state prohibition convention began its session in San Francisco yesterday.

TOO EASILY DISCOURAGED.

We find in the Astoria Pioneer an exceedingly well written editorial, commenting on the recent decision of the supreme court, annulling the law of the Iowa legislature prohibiting the introduction of intoxicating liquors into that state.

The Pioneer remarks further: "The effect of this decision must be to render nugatory all state legislation, looking to the prevention of the manufacture of intoxicating liquors."

A GOOD EXAMPLE.

The charge is laid at the door of the democracy of Oregon that it is parsimonious in the support of its newspaper organs. There is a democratic daily published in this city, which lacks the amplitude and enterprise of a first-class journal.

In our neighbor territory, Washington, they do things differently. A proposition is put forth to start a democratic daily in Seattle, with a capital of \$50,000 to carry it through.

As Washington is applying for statehood, and reproach attaches to a democratic congress for withholding sovereign rights from nearly a million of our fellow citizens living in the most populous dependencies, this effort to disseminate democratic doctrine in such promising missionary ground, cannot fail to meet with official favor.

A few indiscreet admirers of Gov. Penoyer's discharge of his official duties, sought to procure his indorsement in the democratic convention. But his name fell flat, and after some wrangling, the resolution was withdrawn.

Ex-United States Attorney-General Brewster died in Philadelphia yesterday.

THE PROHIBITION MILL.

ED. CAPITAL JOURNAL:—The people of Salem have had a little grist of prohibition feed ground out for them on the small Mill which is being carried around the state in the hope of defeating the republican party.

SALEM, April 4th.

In figuring up the prospects of success in this state next June, for the prohibition candidates, a delegate in the state convention gave the following figures: In 1886, Prof. G. W. Miller received 3000 votes for congress; this year his estimated strength is 4000 to 5000.

To-day the state prohibition convention, in session in San Francisco, adopted a resolution favoring suffrage, and also a law by which all saloons will be closed on Sunday.
