Lightning Flashes of What the World at Large is Doing.

THE FLOODS IN CHINA.

Two Million Persons Drowned--Hun- dreds of Towns Destroyed.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—The Chinese Times says: Repairs in the great breach of the Yellow river go on very slowly and it is said that the difficulties are so excessive that the officials who are supervising the operations despair of success. It is of course impossible to form any ac- curate ideas of the actual loss of life, but the calamity was immense in its proportions, so much so, that many cities, many towns and hun- dreds of small and large villages were destroyed by the surging waters. It seems to us that the Chinese esti- mate that 2,000,000 people were drowned is not altogether incredible. In very many places on the lower levels especially, not a soul escaped alive.

Accident with a Mower.

SANTA ROSA, April 22.—News has reached here of a terrible ac- cident that occurred near Bodega. John H. Miller was engaged in mowing hay, and had cautioned his children against running through the clover in front of the mower. Later in the day his 3-year-old child playfully attempted to run in front of the machine, when it was caught by the knife, and both legs were instantly severed from the body. At last accounts the child was still alive.

A Poor Hiding Place.

BOSTON, April 22.—Miss Emma Brown, a wealthy Boston woman, has been in the habit of tying her jewelry up in her handkerchief and tossing it in the waste basket, think- ing to thus outwit burglars. This bit of strategy was unknown to Miss Brown's colored servant, who, before his mistress arose this morning, emptied the contents of the waste basket into the stove. Loss, \$1,500. Rheumatism and Suicide.

LOS ANGELES, April 22.—Professor Olsen Bugge, a native of Schleswig Holstein, aged 68, committed suicide this morning, by shooting himself through the head. Several months ago rheumatism distorted his fingers so that he could no longer follow his profession of piano teacher. He be- came very despondent and threat- ened to end his life.

Killed his Mother.

LEMARS, (Iowa), 22.—Phillip Held, a young farmer, living four- teen miles west of here, shot and instantly killed his mother, and shortly after committed suicide. The trouble which existed for some time in the family culminated in a squabble over selling a horse.

Too Fond of Bucket Shops.

DAYTON (Ohio), April 22.—James Cummings, manager of the R. G. Dun Commercial Agency, com- mitted suicide this evening by shoot- ing. He has been dealing heavily at bucket shops.

Minister Pendleton Recovering.

BERLIN, April 22.—United States Minister Pendleton is rapidly recov- ering. Pendleton's physician ad- vises him to abstain from work for a long time.

He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital and died at 12 o'clock that night.

In Portland last Friday, Mrs. F. Stoker and child were terribly burned, and they died after twelve hours suffering. But the direct cause of the mother's death was an overdose of morphine administered by an in- experienced physician to alleviate her fearful suffering. The child died from the effect of burns.

Hillsboro Independent: The coal- fields excitement continues without any abatement. Several parties have gone from Hillsboro and other parts of the county into the coal district, and intend to make thorough investigation and ascer- tain the extent of the wealth deposit.

The Oregon Land Co., a day or two ago, sold the Davis place, three miles from Sheridan, in Polk county, owned by Williams & England, of this city, to Thomas Rand, who lately came to this country from England. The farm contains 155 acres, and the price paid was \$2,000.

A THRILLING REMINISCENCE.

A Story of the Cincinnati Riots of Four Years Ago.

The presence at the Palace of Colonel T. C. Campbell, a distin- guished lawyer of Cincinnati, O., recalls strongly to mind the exciting scenes attending the Cincinnati riots of four years ago. While cer- tainly not an actor in the lawless actions which then occurred, Colonel Campbell was nevertheless thoroughly identified with the trouble. The immediate cause of the disturbances, as may be remem- bered, was a verdict of manslaughter, which the mass of the populace in- sisted should have been murder.

Numerous murders had been com- mitted in Cincinnati within a short time previous to this affair, one of peculiar atrocity, the slaughter of a whole family and the sale of their bodies to a dissecting school, happen- ing about the same time.

When the case of the white boy came to trial and resulted in his conviction of manslaughter, things grew rapidly worse, culminating in the scenes not yet forgotten even upon this coast. Thousands of ex- cited people attacked the jail, but failing to obtain the prisoner, burned the court house, with its valuable library and priceless records, besides wrecking everything else in reach. The military were called out, fight- ing ensued and over 100 people were killed. The prisoner, however, was safely conveyed to the penitentiary and is still there, serving out his twenty years' sentence.

Colonel Campbell had defended the boy, and therefore incurred much animosity, and the day after the destruction of the court house a mob 500 strong started out to his residence, situated in the suburbs, vowing to burn it down. Rejecting the advice of his friends, he refused to fly, and with the assistance of his brother and three servants, all armed with Winchester, success- fully repelled the assailants. His house was surrounded by thick woods, and through these, encircling lines of barbed wire, over which the assal- tants blindly stumbled, to their no little confusion. A few random shots from the rifles was all that was needed to complete their discom- fiture.

All the jurors in the case except one, and nearly all the criminal lawyers in the city, fled during the excitement. The solitary juror who remained, loaded himself up with revolvers, defying those who threat- ened him, and escaped unharmed.—San Francisco Examiner.
