Itemized Account of Doings in City and Country.

MARION COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Some Statistical Information Regarding Their Condition and Cost.

The educational statistics for the biennial term 1887 and 1888 are now being made up in the department of public instruction. The annual report of Supt. Peebles, of Marion county, having been submitted, the following items taken therefrom will be of a good deal of interest to the readers of the JOURNAL:

There are 6755 persons between 4 and 20 years of age resident in the county, 3450 of whom are males and 3305 females; 1925 males and 1712 females resident in the county were enrolled in the public schools during the year. One hundred and fifty-one pupils were enrolled under 6 years of age; 225 resident pupils attended schools outside their districts during the year. The average daily attendance during the year was 1399 males and 1294 females—a total of 2693. Seventy-four female and 93 male teachers were employed in the public schools during the year ending March 5. 1144 males and 1136 females were reported as not attending any school during the year. Thirty teachers were employed in private schools, and 689 pupils, 318 males and 371 females, were enrolled therein.

The value of school houses and school grounds is placed at \$93,498.50, an increase in the value of such property of \$7468.50 since last year; school furniture, \$7385.50, an increase of \$385.50 over the estimate of 1887. Charts, maps, globes, etc., \$1063.25, an increase of \$433.25 over 1887. This property is insured for \$20,550.

The average salary paid male teachers in Marion county during the year was \$40 per month, and to female teachers \$30. There are now 91 organized districts in county; 38 months private school has been taught in nine schools; two frame school houses erected during the year. Eight graded schools with an enrollment of 925 employ 22 teachers; one university, two colleges, and five academies employ 36 teachers with 485 pupils enrolled. Seventy-eight districts have suitable record books and 32 school rooms are supplied with Webster's unabridged dictionaries. 3475 legal voters for school purposes reported by clerks. The county superintendent visited schools in ninety districts, devoting one hour to each visit, traveling 1600 miles.

The amount of school fund raised by district taxes was \$100,38.26; apportioned from county fund \$19,989.55; apportionment of state fund, \$6763; raised by rate bills \$1482.83; received from other sources, \$1634.41; on hand first Monday in March 87, \$5681.11; total receipts \$45,589.16. Paid out for teachers' wages during the year \$26,825.83; repairs on school houses and sites \$639.79; purchase of furniture \$164.60; fuel and other necessary incidentals \$164.09; clerks services \$2575.00; apparatus, globes, charts, etc., \$206.27; building school houses, etc., \$7047.95; insurance \$975.00; all other purposes, \$403.22; total disbursements, \$40,477.75; balance in hands of clerks, March 5, 1888, \$5111.41. Amount of unapportioned school funds in the hands of the county treasurer \$31185.28.

Building Improvements.

Work is progressing very rapidly on R. S. Wallace's new residence on Court and Capital streets. The outside work on Mr. R. B. Fleming's new cottage on Center and Cottage streets is nearly completed. The frame work on the new and elegant cottage being built for O. E. Krause on Court and Winter streets is beginning to assume the shape of a house. There is a great deal of building improvement going on in and about Salem. George D. Goodhue has completed his new cottage on south Winter street, and is now occupying it. Ed. Hutchins' new cottage between Winter and Cottage streets on Mill is nearly finished.

Republican Rally.

The republicans of Sublimity precinct and adjacent country are going to have a grand rally on the first Saturday in May at Whiteaker. Prof. M. G. Lane, of Salem, Capt. J. Ormsby, of Silver Falls city, and other prominent speakers are to be present, and a grand whooping up time is to be had.
