

Senator Dolph yesterday made a speech in favor of the land grant forfeiture bill, but took the ground that it should be so amended as to protect homesteaders and prevent the enormous lobby now in Washington robbing settlers.

It is reported that Prince George, second son of the Prince of Wales, is in the city of Mexico in disguise. The prince is said to have arrived there with a party of English noblemen on a yacht.

The latest slate proposed by the president is said to be Phelps for Chief Justice, Endicott for Minister to England, and Collins, of Massachusetts, to take the latter's place in the cabinet.

In London the great sensation of the hour is Lord Randolph Churchill's speech, in which he definitely breaks with the government on the Irish question.

The Grant banquet will be attended by about a hundred guests. Gen. Sherman gives the speech.

STATE NEWS.

The fruit growers of Douglas county have appointed a committee to solicit stock for a cannery at Roseburg.

Thousands of people gathered at McMinnville on the 21st, to witness the fine stock show. About 50 horses were in competition. Many were sold.

Baker City Democrat: Most encouraging reports come in from the mines in the western portion of the county. Not a day passes but miners and prospectors come to this city for supplies to be used in prospecting and developing their claims.

The barn of Jasper Rickard, of Monroe precinct, caught fire last Sunday evening and burned to the ground. The loss is estimated between five and six hundred dollars. Among other things his wagon harness, and about four tons of hay were destroyed by the flames.

Will Filed.

The will and testament of Thos. Howard Hunsaker, who died on the 7th inst., was yesterday evening filed for and admitted to probate in the county court. The will leaves all the property to his wife in trust during her life time. Afterward to be divided equally between his children Angeline Davis, G. W. Hunsaker, James J. Hunsaker, Wm. L. Hunsaker, Fanny Hunsaker and Corn May Hunsaker. He nominated his wife Elizabeth J. Hunsaker and her two brothers Monroe Miller and M. S. Miller executors of this will and testament to serve without bonds. The will is dated Jan. 25, 1878, and was made in the presence of G. W. Lawson, C. A. Schibred and G. A. Cutting. Mr. Hillary, Marion Cooke and James Duncen were appointed appraisers of the estate.
