TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

CINCHING THE COWBOYS. The Chickasaws Demand Unreasonable Grass Money--the Cattle Owners Resist. GAINESVILLE, Texas, June 12.--Some time ago the cattle men of the Chickasaw Nation of Indian Territory resisted a cattle tax of \$16 per head for cattle grazing on Indian lands, and drove the collector and his deputies away with violence. The Governor was notified, and through him the United States government. A peaceable settlement was attempted, but without a result favorable to the Indians. The cowboys began to assemble, and now about 500 are rendezvoused in the southern part of the Nation. Gov. Guy has ordered out the national militia, about 100 Indians, and they are encamped now at Ardmore, preparatory to moving upon the cowboys. Captain McLish was put in command of them, and he has orders to move them at once. To-day the camp was astr getting ready for the campaign, and it is expected troops will be on the march to-morrow. They will move cautiously, as it is feared they are not strong enough to combat the cattlemen, who are armed with Winchester. Many of these men are citizens of the nation, and it is feared that this is the first outbreak of a civil war. Government troops at Fort Reno are prepared to take the field in case the Chickasaws cannot quell the disturbances. TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS. The Rhode Island legislature has re-elected Jonathan A. CITY COUNCIL.

A Six Mill Tax Levy--Reducing the Police Force--"Economy is Wealth." The council met last night and after the usual preliminaries the committee on ways and means made the following report: To the Mayor and Members of the City Council--Gentlemen:--We, your committee on ways and means, to whom was referred the city assessment roll of the city of Salem for the year 1888, would most respectfully report and recommend that the tax levy be made on the basis of five mills on all taxable property of the city, as assessed by the city assessor; and also recommend that the city dispense with the services of one policeman, and also the services of the city attorney for the time being, as we think each an unnecessary expense to the city. The Coming State Fair.

Meeting Capt. J. T. Apperson, president of the State Agricultural Association at the train this morning, a writer of this paper asked concerning the outlook for the coming state fair. "I think it is excellent from present indications," said he. "Do you think the Portland Industrial fair will have any effect towards weakening the state fair?" "No, I don't think it will," was responded. "I think on the contrary, it will have a good effect on the state fair, I think we will get a good deal of support from the North Pacific Association. It will do away with the Mechanics' fair in Portland, and I don't think will work against the state fair as much as the old Mechanics' fair did." Coming down the street, Secretary J. T. Gregg was asked his opinion concerning the outlook, and he echoed President Apperson's predictions. "On what do you base your predictions, Mr. Secretary?" the reporter inquired. "On the fact that a larger number of letters of inquiry are being received, than ever before, together with more applications for the premium list; then the entries for the races this year are larger and better than ever before. Yet, there is one thing that will touch a popular vein this year, and do us much good in the pavilion exhibit, and that is the fact that no entrance fees will be charged on any article entered in the ladies department, and that good premiums are offered for everything in the pavilion display. The ladies have always objected to paying entrance fees on exhibits, and I am glad they are required no longer. It will bring us a very large exhibit of ladies work, I feel sure.
