Railroad Train Breaks Through. MONTGOMERY (Ala.), June 27.—This morning a train south bound proceeding to Mobile went through a small bridge near Tensas.

Imperial Vaporings. The rampant feudalism of the proclamation issued by the new German Emperor to his army Saturday is a portent of evil for Germany and for Europe.
