POSTMASTERS ACCUSED.

Making False Returns of Stamp Cancellations so as to Increase Their Salaries.

Boston, Mass., special: Inspector Townsend, of the postoffice department, has just completed an inspection of the New England postoffices. Suspicion had been aroused at Washington by sudden and inexplicable variations of the receipts of certain offices. The result of this investigation, it is said, has shown that it has been a practice with not a few of the postmasters to make false returns of their stamp cancellations in order to get a larger salary out of the government. It was found in one instance that a postmaster had been reporting to the government that he had cancelled \$800 worth of stamps per annum, while his successor did a business of only \$400 a year. The conclusion was irresistible, unless some palpable facts were presented to account for the deficiency that the old postmaster had been making false returns to the government. It is said that there are about fifty such cases in the New England district, everyone of them backed by evidence of the guilt of the accused. These cases involve a good many thousands of dollars in the aggregate, although in a large number of them the amounts are small. These offices, as a rule, are in small places and have been conducted by all sorts of people. Some of them have been women; and rural deacons, who are regarded as moral bulwarks in their communities, are not unknown in the list.

SEATTLE has been going ahead too fast, with its street improvements and issue of scrip to pay for the same. A number of contractors who hold \$20,000 worth of scrip, have drawn off because they cannot get it negotiated. Some others who have been fortunate enough to dispose of the paper, continue their work. The city council, at its last meeting, passed an ordinance providing for the issuance of bonds guaranteeing the payment of the interest on the scrip semi-annually and the principal when due. This will be satisfactory for all future issues of city scrip.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

The Dead Warrior at Home. WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The funeral train bearing the remains of General Sheridan arrived at the Baltimore & Potomac station at 5:15 o'clock this afternoon. Eight sergeants of artillery bore the casket, on which was the American flag and the dead General's hat and sword, from the train to an artillery caisson, on which it was conveyed to St. Matthews church. A troop of cavalry under Captain Lawton acted as escort, and a long line of carriages followed the caisson. The remains will lie in state at the church, watched by the local Legion Guard of Honor.

Run into a Wasp's Nest. Wichita, Kan., Aug. 9.—Benjamin Watkins, engaged by a farmer in the western part of the county, met a fearful death yesterday while mowing. He was driving a team attached to a mower, when he ran into a wasp's nest. The enraged wasps flew at the horses and stung them so that they began running away. Watkins could not hold the horses and was thrown from his seat in front of the mower and literally cut to pieces. His remains were so badly cut to pieces that they had to be picked up in a box.

The Sugar Trust. NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The members of the great sugar refiners' trust are said to be in great trouble. The trust men say Spreckels has undertaken a greater job than he can handle. A wholesale grocer said: "If Spreckels can crush the trust he will be conferring an immense benefit upon all of us. We all want cheap sugar. It is a mistake to suppose that grocers favor high prices. High prices always reduce the volume of trade. If a commodity is dear, people always use as little as they can."

Clearing the Senate Calendar. WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Senator Sherman has sent a circular note to the republican senators, asking each if there are any measures pending before the senate in which he is especially interested, and upon which he desires action by the senate during this session. The recipients are requested to reply to the committee in order of business. It is understood to be the intention of the committee to provide for clearing the calendar of important business before the tariff bill is brought in.

Mobile has quarantined against Jacksonville, and no persons, baggage or freight are allowed to enter Mobile. There is a movement on foot for holding requiem mass for General Sheridan in all the Catholic churches of the leading cities of the United States.

The World says: "It has become clear to the friends of Robert Garrett during the past week that he is really insane and that there are but faint hopes of his ultimate recovery."

A Washington dispatch says the president will neither sign nor veto the river and harbor bill, but will let it become a law without his signature. The ten days' limit for action expires to-morrow.

A delegation from British Columbia is in London to urge the government to adopt proposals to secure the settlement in Vancouver's island of 250 crofter families, the provincial government guaranteeing to repay the principal and interest of funds advanced for that object.
