TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

The Russian wheat crop will be a good average.

The fisheries treaty has been defeated in the senate by a vote of 31 to 29. Secretary Bayard considers it a misfortune.

A vote will be taken in Walla Walla on Tuesday next to build a new \$25,000 school house, the present building being over crowded.

There is a talk of Joseph Pulitzer, proprietor of the New York World, establishing a two cent morning democratic paper in Washington.

Yesterday a man named W. Eiman, was mysteriously shot in Los Angeles. M. Trayner is arrested on suspicion. The wounded man will die.

The wheat crop of India is estimated at 260,000,000 bushels of 62 pounds to the bushel. This will ensure a good increase in the quantity exported.

Henry George and Col. Ingersoll will shortly debate Protection and Free Trade in New York. George represents the Free Trade club, and the other speaker the Protective League.

Frank Malloy, proprietor of the American hotel, Arbuttle, Cal., was fatally shot by his friend, F. R. Glover, a railroad agent, while the latter was loading his revolver. The shooting was accidental.

A weekly mail route has been established from Silver Lake to Prineville and bids advertised for. Service will be increased from once to twice a week on the route from Summer Lake to Silver Lake from Sept. 1st next.

A telegram from San Francisco to-day reports that the Steamship Oceanic from China, while entering San Francisco harbor, collided with the steamer City of Chester, belonging to the Pacific Mail Steamship Co. Fifteen persons were drowned.

FRUIT INTERESTS OF OREGON.

It is on record within the year that Mr. A. H. Hatch, President of the State Horticulturist Association of California, on his first visit to Oregon, last December—not the best season of the year to estimate fruits—stated the finest apples he ever saw in his life were some that he had seen at Ashland, in Southern Oregon. During his brief sojourn in the state on his way to Portland, Mr. Hatch was shown other fruits of Oregon, in the Umpqua Valley and in the Willamette Valley. In Portland he announced it publicly, that he felt convinced that in the choice of hardy fruits—apples, pears, plums, prunes and cherries, Oregon surpassed the world. This was honest praise, won by merit. Cultivation, and care in the cultivation, to produce the superior fruits, is the only condition required to advance Oregon fruits in the estimation of the Eastern markets, from the Mississippi to the Atlantic—in the great cities, in the most profitable markets. This cultivation is the first essential. The old methods will not do. Nurseries should receive watchful care, to cultivate only the good, to root up and cast aside the indifferent. Similar care is required in the advancement to orchard planting and production. And the care of the trees and the picking, handling, boxing and preparing the fruit for market, should not be neglected in any stage of the complete process. It is the handsome box of fruit which attracts the eye and commands the topmost price. But there should be honest packing—the average of the top layer kept all the way to the bottom of the box. This makes the reputation and secures ready sale at top prices.—Portland News.

TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

A Deluging Rain.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 21.—It has been raining incessantly since 11 o'clock last night. Since 8 o'clock this morning over 3 1/2 inches of water had fallen, being the greatest fall in eighteen years. The same reports are coming in from all sections of Western Pennsylvania, Eastern Ohio and Western Virginia. At Brownsville, Pa., the water in the Monongahela river is rising at the rate of three feet an hour. Great damage has already been done to railroads leading from this city. At Uniontown, Pa., four and one-half inches of rain fell since early this morning. Redstone creek is higher than ever before, and people living in the lower portion of the city are moving out of their houses to-night. Trains on the Southwest branch of the Pennsylvania road and the Connellsville branch of the Baltimore & Ohio have stopped running.

Yellow Fever Panic.

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 21.—The panic and exodus among negroes over the fever continues. Surgeon-General Hamilton, who is here, says that although it was hoped the disease was being overcome, nothing can be predicted during the hot weather, which has yet two months to run. A corps of sanitary police has been organized to aid the other defense organizations. To-day 500 negroes visited the city in hopes of receiving a share of the relief fund from the government, and were amazed when told that they could draw nothing unless injured by the fever.

Pleasant Reception.

OLYMPIA, Aug. 21.—Last evening the members of the Women's Club, the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and other kindred societies met at Mrs. P. C. Hale's residence in East Olympia, to extend a welcome to Mrs. Clara B. Colby, editor and proprietor of the Beatrice, Neb., Women's Journal, and Mrs. Elizabeth Lyle Saxton, of Washington, D. C. The evening was pleasantly spent in discussing matters of interest to the women of the territory.

The new Catholic church will soon be enclosed, as the shingling is well advanced. There is to be a festival after awhile for the raising of more funds for the work.
