TELEGRAPHIC SPLINTS.

A drummer and collector for the Hudson's Bay Co., named Gill, has decamped with \$10,000.

Ex-Minister Lathop, from the court of St. Petersburg, and family, arrived in New York yesterday.

Edward K. Ross has been appointed postmaster at Huntington, Baker county, Ore., vice Julius T. Tyler, removed.

Louis Cohen, a drygoods merchant in Nogales, Ariz., was beaten to death yesterday by burglars, and his store robbed.

At the Roslyn mines the work of fortifying the camp is going on, and a strong guard is posted to prevent surprise or attack.

The bill granting Mrs. Gen. Sheridan a pension of \$5,000 a year, has been placed on the senate calendar, with the recommendation that the amount be reduced to \$3,500.

Ten of the victims of the Neenah, Wis., disaster were buried yesterday; the shops and stores were closed, and the town officials with a long concourse of citizens followed the remains.

Cleveland's message to congress recommending retaliation upon Canada, has stirred up a breeze in London and the dominion, and the notices of the president are now less complimentary.

Two F. F. V's, students in the theological college at Richmond, paying court to the same lady, got into a disgraceful row in her presence, and the most demonstrative of the pair was taken to the lockup.

The bond to secure costs necessary to appeal the woman suffrage case of Washington Territory, to the United States supreme court, has been executed and approved, and the matter will go forward to final arbitration.

Chauncey M. Depew will return from Europe shortly, and preparations are making to give him a rousing reception. New York republicans seem to hold in high esteem those presidential aspirants who have committed hari-kari.

Stating it Plainly.

We have received visits from several of our leading politicians to inquire why the Kieker doesn't take a decided political stand in favor of one party or the other. It is a question easily answered. We are not publishing a newspaper for fun. Our convictions all run to publishing a dictionary or an almanac, thus leaving us neutral in politics.

A Secure Retreat.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Aug. 24.—The Blade's Middle Bass special says: There is not another summer resort in America where Gen. Harrison could have found a more perfect retreat and such complete seclusion as in this spot. Several persons came in from Cleveland to-day and asked to be allowed to see the general, but the members of the club steadily refused to disturb him.

Hop Pickers Wanted.

SEATTLE Aug. 24.—Hop growers are becoming greatly alarmed at the great scarcity of hop pickers. This time last year Indians were flocking in large numbers from the north to the hop fields, but now no movement is noticed. The supposition is they became frightened last year by the terrible ravages of a virulent type of measles which attacked them killing off many, especially the young.

Judge Thurman's Movements.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 24.—It is learned here, that in the event of Judge Thurman's return home in good health, after a week's work he will enteractively into the campaign, making one speech in New York and one in Brooklyn. As soon as the certain time is fixed for arguing the telephone suits, the date of his New York speech will be announced. The programme is to have Judge Thurman make a speech in New York, and then go to Washington and make argument in the telephone suits, and return to Brooklyn for another address. After this it is said he will make a trip to the Pacific coast.

That Missing Money Package.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—The whereabouts of the missing money package containing \$10,000, that was delivered at the Portland, Oregon, postoffice, for transmission to the Chemical bank in this city, is still a mystery. Active search for it is still in progress. It seems to be quite certain that the package was not lost on the journey from Portland here, and that it was stolen or mislaid either in New York or Portland. The officers and postoffice clerks feel keenly the investigation, as it puts them, to a certain degree, under suspicion and semi-surveillance. Postmaster Pearson will only say that a thorough search is being made, and that further than that he knew nothing.

Heavy Northern Pacific Deal.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—The Northern Pacific has completed a sale of about \$57,000,000 of securities. The price is not made known. The sale is to a syndicate headed by Henry Villard. The bonds will go to Europe, where the bulk of the third mortgage is already held. The transaction is said to extinguish the floating debt and leave something less than \$2,000,000 in the treasury to be expended in improvements. An independent company, with a capital of \$5,000,000, has been formed for the purpose of supplying the railroad with equipment, and large orders for engines and cars have been placed. The equipment company is composed of large stockholders and directors of the Northern Pacific organization, and the railroad is not bound for anything beyond the rental of the equipment furnished to it.

STATE NEWS.

W. S. Ladd, of Portland, recently bought 5,000 acres of timber land near Tillamook for \$4 per acre. The government timber inspector Williams was the seller.

Astorian Pioneer: Forest fires are raging at several points along the river and in the dark of the moon will not assist the navigators who pilot the night boat up and down the river.

Dennis Porter, a well known saw mill owner near Ashland, was run over by a heavy lumber wagon on Saturday, and died yesterday. He was 50 years of age. The funeral took place on Thursday.
