Ship Ashore. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—Capt. Lewis, of the barkentine Webfoot, reports a schooner ashore in Gray's harbor.

A Cloud-Burst. COLTON, Sept. 17.—There was a great cloud-burst at Ferris yesterday. A house was blown down and several persons were severely injured.

Steamer Dought. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—The steamer Caracas was sold this morning to the Oregon Development Company for \$175,000. She will run to Yaquina bay.

Shake. SAN JOSE, Sept. 17.—A sharp earthquake awoke nearly every person in this city at 3:48 o'clock this morning. The vibrations were north and south, one a minute.

A Chance. PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 17.—Messrs. Young and Meeker, who represent the Puyallup hop growers, yesterday sent 125 hop pickers to the field via the Northern Pacific Railroad. Several hundred more pickers are wanted, and Mr. Young is at the St. Charles Hotel, where he can be seen by those who desire work. Pickers earn from \$1.50 to \$2.50 per day.

Wisconsin Capital. YREKA, Sept. 16.—Wisconsin capitalists have purchased Dave Horn's ferry and ranch, near the railroad crossing on Klamath river to erect a sawmill for cutting 150,000 feet of lumber per day. They have also secured some 30,000 acres of timber land in Oregon, just over the California line, with some in this county close to the Oregon boundary.

Shippers Pleased. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 17.—The rate on compressed grease wool to New York and other Atlantic seaports, which has just been reduced from \$1.60 to \$1.50 per hundred, was to-day reduced 25 cents more. The rate is now \$1.25 on the hundred. H. C. Bush says that if the railroads keep on reducing rates on wool free trade will cut no figure whatever in the profits of California and Oregon wool growers.

Accommodating. CATLETTSBURG, Ky., Sept. 17.—Two men, Steele and Mackubie, both drunk, boarded the freight train at Mt. Sterling yesterday afternoon and fought all the way to Steepstone, where the conductor, for the safety of the passengers put the men off and let them fight it out. They drew pistols and exchanged five shots each. The fifth shot from Steele's pistol passed through Mackubie's brain, killing him. They were consigned. After the killing Steele boarded the train and proceeded homeward, the train having waited until the duel was over.

Clinched. WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—A motion to reconsider the Chinese bill was defeated this afternoon in the senate, by a vote of 20 ayes to 21 nays.

There is great rejoicing among all of the California delegation. None of them appear to doubt that the president will sign the bill, or if not wishing to take an aggressive position in the matter, do as he frequently does, allow it to become a law by the expiration of the ten days' limit.
