Mexico and the Mormons.
St. Louis, Sept. 30. The move-
ment of Mormons toward Mexico is
assuming definite shape and large
proportions. They recently purchas-
ed 70,000 square miles of Indian
land in Mexico.

McCune Released.
McMINNVILLE, Sept. 30.--At the
preliminary trial of Willard Mc-
Cune, Judge Hart Hurley conducted
the defense and it was proved that
McCune shot Bewley in self-defense
and has been released from custody.
There is some talk that the case will
be brought before the grand jury.

Germany Crop Failure.
BERLIN, Sept. 30.--The failure of
the harvest in Germany is attracting
serious attention. There is a poor
crop of cereals and potatoes. The
price of bread is rapidly rising.
Since 1887 rye has advanced 48
marks and wheat 34 marks. In some
districts bakers have raised the price
of bread 10 pfennings per pound.

The Longest Session.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.--When the
two houses of congress were called
to order at 12 o'clock to-day the ses-
sion will have become the longest
by twenty-four hours in American
history. The longest preceding ses-
sion was that of 1850, the year of
the Missouri compromise, which
was adjourned at noon September
30.

From The Orient.
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.--The
steamer City of New York from
China and Japan brings the fol-
lowing advices:
Cholera is carrying off large num-
bers in various parts of China.
A cattle plague has broken out in
Shansi, and animals are dying by
the thousands.
Heavy rains prevailed in Japan.
Several rivers overflowed, inundat-
ing the surrounding country.
Fochow was visited by a terrible
typhoon in the latter part of August.

Good News at Last.
JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 30.--The
cool, bracing weather has had a most
gratifying effect, as shown by marked
decrease in the number of new cases
of yellow fever reported here. For
several nights overcoats have proved
comfortable. The city health officer
says the epidemic, which seems to
have gone out to the suburbs, is
rapidly abating and there is much
less sickness in the outlying wards
than was the case a few days ago.
There were 79 cases of yellow fever
reported to-day; 13 whites. There
were 6 deaths. The total number of
cases is 2626. The total number of
deaths is 255.

Port Townsend's Railroad.
PORT TOWNSEND, W. T., Sept. 30.
--Tomorrow some 200 men will be-
gin the work of grading on the Port
Townsend Southern railway. It
was intended to make a start some
two weeks earlier, but great diffi-
culty has been experienced in secur-
ing men. Some score of hands have
been at work for several days slash-
ing the wood and undergrowth so
far as the final survey has been com-
pleted. There is a movement on
foot to close up the stores generally
and celebrate such an auspicious
event in a proper manner. This
movement will be partly if not wholly
successful, and a large number
will be present to see the pioneer,
Judge Briggs, throw the first shovel-
ful of earth.

**Chairman English, of the Demo-
cratic State Central Committee says
that he has information that Presi-
dent Cleveland had decided to sign
the Scott Chinese exclusion bill.**
At Truckee, Cal., yesterday the
Chinese and Indians created a great
excitement and a law and order
league has been organized. A reso-
lution was adopted ordering all
Chinese to leave the city. The cause
of the riot and blood shed was that
the Chinese had sold whisky and
opium to the Indians.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.
Randall's illness is reported to
have produced a mental disorder.
Snow fell in parts of Pennsylvania
and Indiana Saturday. It was a
welcome visitor.
Frost Saturday night is reported
in a number of eastern and south-
ern states. It will soon put an end
to yellow fever.
A case of yellow fever is thought
to have developed in Washington,
D. C. A Jacksonville refugee is the
afflicted one.
A killing frost visited Chatta-
nooga yesterday morning. It was
most welcome and is doing much
to allay all fears.
The opinion prevails that there
will be no adjournment of senate or
house this session, but merely a
recess for election.
The big September wheat deal
closed at Chicago Saturday night.
Hutchinson it is said cleared nearly
three million dollars.
There have been no new cases of
smallpox at McMinnville for six-
teen days, except two persons that
were exposed and have been kept
under strict quarantine at the pest
house for nearly two weeks. All
the patients are getting along very
well and if no unexpected cases
develop the public schools will
probably begin soon.

LATE OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.
**News and Notes of a General In-
terest to the Westerner.**
Yamhill county has 49 pensioners
who receive \$1,419 annually.
Oregon has 1,454 pensioners who
are annually paid \$39,721.75. There
are 321 more pensioners in the state
than in 1887.
Lane county has about 1,000 acres
in hops, and the present year's in-
come from that source will be not
less than \$125,000.
It is rumored that the Oregon and
Washington Territory railroad
which starts at Wallula, will pass
through Harney valley.
A movement is on foot for the
organization of an American club at
Astoria to expound the principles of
the new American party.
Work is progressing on the Tilla-
mook court house, although the in-
junction proceedings are said not to
have been disposed of to the entire
satisfaction of all.
It is stated in railroad circles that
Charles Francis Adams, president of
the Union Pacific railroad, is consid-
ering a plan to build on the O. R. &
N. branch from Portland to Astoria.
An assay by a San Francisco man
of some quartz from the quarry
owned by the South Benton Mineral
Development company, situated
near Monros, showed a total of
\$720.87 per ton of gold.
In Douglas county many people
are planting extensively of prune
and various trees. The fruit crop
this year was immense and people
are beginning to realize the advan-
tages of that section for fruit-grow-
ing.
The grand jury for Baker county
returned a true bill of indictment for
murder in the first degree against
Arthur Helm for the killing of Bud
Douglas at Cracker City a week ago.
The defendant is a fine looking
young man of about 28 years of age.
The town of La Grande has a wife
beater, who was last week brought
before a justice of the peace and
fined ten dollars for assault. So
much, so good; only he probably
should have received a much heavier
fine.
The grapes of Oregon are as pro-
lific as in any other portion of the
world, and their flavor is good. The
state can become one of the greatest
grape and wine producing countries
on the globe, if the people choose to
make it so.
Oregon has fine timber. An Ore-
gon City mill last week saved eight
pieces 80 feet long, 14x14 at the
large end and 12x12 at the small
end; also eight pieces of the same
size only they were 90 feet long.
This same mill recently sawed a log
out of which was made 12,295 feet of
good merchantable lumber.
