

Still Bad at Buffalo.

BUFFALO, Oct 1 .- Ten weeks ago a case of smallpox was discovered here. Since then there have been sixty-nine cases and seventeen deaths, six of which were caused by black smallpox, which is the most fatal. There are now twenty-two cases in the hospital.

A Pendleton Saicide.

PENDLETON, Oct. I.-F. H. Sawtelle, a well known and respected citizen, was found dead under the railroad bridge, a mile below town, this morning, with a bullet hole through his skull. No More Chinese,

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 .- The president signed the Chinese bill and transmitted it to congress accompanied by a long message.

Section I of the bill, provides that from and after the passage of this act it shall be unlawful for any Chinese laborer who shall at any time heretofore have been, or who may now be about to be a resident within the United States, and who shall have departed or shall depart from it and shall not have returned before the passage of this act to return or remain in the United States.

Section 2 provides that no certificate of identity provided for in the sale at this office.

fourth and fifth sections of this act, to which this is a supplement, shall hereafter be issued, and every certificate heretofore issued in pursuance thereof, is hereby declared void and of no effect, and the Chinese laborer claiming admission by virtue thereof shall not be permitted to enter the United States.
