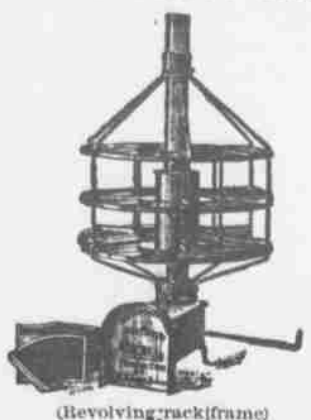

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Death on the Rail - Yellow Fever - Railway Rumors - Much Crisp News.

Four New Cases.

DECATUR, Ala., Oct. 10. - Four new cases of yellow fever. No deaths.

REDDING, Oct. 10. - Lee Sykes, charged with killing George Henderson a year ago, while attempting to stop a stage, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to imprisonment for life.

Blaine Talks.

GOSHEN, Ind., Oct. 10. - About 45,000 people assembled here to-day to listen to an address by James G. Blaine. When he was introduced there was an outburst of applause which lasted several minutes.

Big Damages.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9. - The jury in the case of George T. Smith vs. Whittier, Fuller, & Co., to recover \$100,000 damages for personal injuries received by an elevator accident in defendant's store, in 1878, to-day awarded plaintiff \$30,000 damage.

Thousands of Women Vote.

BOSTON, Oct. 10. - The assessment for poll tax closed and the registry list shows the applications of 4,138 women during the day, making a total registration of 23,140 women. The total vote last year was 51,771, of which less than 900 were women. The election occurs in December.

A Fatal Duel.

PENDLETON, Oct. 9. - A shooting scrape occurred Thursday in the mountains forty miles from here, between Enoch Bowley, a sheep herder, and Ed and Len Campbell, sheep owners. Bowley drew his pistol and emptied it at the Campbells. Two bullets struck Len Campbell, but Ed escaped unhurt. Ed Campbell drew his revolver and fired one shot, just as Bowley retired in the bush. It took effect. Len Campbell has just died from his injuries and Bowley is not expected to live.

Almost Desolate.

ST. PAUL, Oct. 10. - Mayor Smith has received an appeal for aid from the citizens of Ramsay county, which conveys the intelligence that the whole population of that county is on the verge of starvation. It is signed by the county officials and prominent citizens. According to the appeal the frosts destroyed hundreds of thousands of bushels of wheat, and left entire townships almost destitute. The county treasury is empty, and unless assistance is soon received it is feared that many will die.

Diseased California Meat.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10. - At a special meeting of the city board of health the question of diseased meat was discussed. Dr. C. A. Mercor laid before the board some results of his investigations in this state. He said the condition of the cattle in the entire valley of Salinas is one of rottenness, and the same conditions exist down to Santa Barbara and San Diego. Animals have died near these towns from anthrax and Texas fever, and we have traced the history of some of the diseased cattle from the Joaquin valley to the Salinas valley.

Malignant Diphtheria.

WHATCOM, Oct. 10. - A family named Templeton, who recently arrived from Nebraska, brought with them through Seattle, a most malignant case of diphtheria. One child died and two others are down sick. The city has removed the family outside of town, and precautions are being taken to prevent the spread of the disease. No further danger is apprehended either from this case or the smallpox near Blaine but it might be suggested that both these cases were imported to this country, and remarkable to say, have not spread.

A New Transcontinental.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9. - The projectors of a line to a connection with the Union Pacific, have been

very busy recently. Much importance continues to be attached to this enterprise by local railroad men, who say the road is sure to form a link in the chain of some transcontinental line. The Burlington, Milwaukee & St. Paul and Chicago and Northwestern are all reported to have examined the route, and the persons controlling the passes and rights of way are said to have a good thing, no matter who takes it off their hands.

A Fatal Collision.

PORTSVILLE, Pa., Oct. 10. - Information reached this city to-night of a terrible accident which occurred on the Lehigh Valley railroad, at Mud Run, the first station above Penn Haven. A grand parade of Catholic societies took place at Hazleton to-day, and a large excursion was run from Wilkesbarre for the occasion, composed of lodges, bands, and sightseers from Wilkesbarre, Nanticoke and other points along the line. The excursion train was run in two sections, and upon their return trip to-night the rear section ran into the forward section at Mud Run, about 9 o'clock, with disastrous results. Several cars of the forward section were telescoped, and forty persons were killed outright and about an equal number injured, many of them probably fatally.

A Sick Man's Oath.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10. - A cablegram has been received to the effect that James C. Flood had a relapse this morning at Heidelberg, Germany, where he has been under treatment for the past few weeks. The second cablegram stated that the attack was not so bad as at first thought, and that Mr. Flood's condition is not dangerous.

Yellow Fever Report.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 10. - The day has been very cold and it has rained incessantly since 3 a. m. Official bulletin: New cases, 63; deaths, 3. Total cases to date, 3382; total deaths, 392.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The death is announced of Father Schleyer, the inventor of Volapuk.

A large flow of natural gas was struck near Kansas City a few days ago, and a flame fully twenty-five feet high shot up from the ground.

A war in passenger rates to the east was inaugurated at Denver yesterday which sent the rates to Missouri river points down nearly one-third, and proportionally to other eastern points.

President T. F. Oakes, of the Northern Pacific and J. M. Hanford, traffic manager of the road, left St. Paul for Portland Tuesday night. They will go first to Tacoma where they are due to-morrow night. Information of a most startling nature has been received from Gallipolis, Ohio, an important river town. It is to the effect that three deaths have taken place there, the cause of which was yellow fever. The physicians are somewhat reticent, but admit that the symptoms are those of yellow fever.

A Remarkable Coincidence.

The killing of Bud Douglas at Craker Creek and John Smith at Weber City on the same day brings to light a remarkable coincidence, says an exchange. It is said that John Smith was quite recently on a visit to the mines at Craker Creek and one day remarked: "I'll be the first to start a graveyard in the new camp." Bud Douglas hearing Smith's remark, rejoined: "Not much Smith, I'll get there myself." And Bud Douglas did start it, but Smith was at the same time trying hard to keep his word good.
