ion of victory, Philip II Sheridan, In the spirit of those great leaders, and of our own devotion to human liberty, and with that hostility to all forms of desput-semand oppression which is the fundamental idea of the Republican party, we send fraternal congratulations to our feltow Americans of Brazil upon their great act of emancipation, which completed the abolition of slavery throughout the two American continents. [We earnestly hope that we may soon congratulate our fellow-citizens of Irish birth upon the peaceful recovery of home rule for Ireland.

We hold the free and honest popular ballot, servant except and the just and equal representation of all the people, to be the foundation of our republican government, and demand effective legislation to secure the integrity and purity of elections, which are the fountains of all public authority. We charge that the present administration and the Democratic majority in Congress owe their existence to the suppression of the ballot by a criminal nullification of the Constitution and laws of the United States.

We are uncompromisingly in favor of the American system of protection. We protest against its destruction proposed by the president and his party. They serve the interests of Europe; we will support the interests of America. We accept the issues and confidently appeal to the people for their judgment. The protective system must be maintaired, Its abandonment has always been followed:

Secure the rehabilitation of our American merchant marine, and we protest against the passage by Congress of a free ship bill, as calculated to work injustice to labor by lessening the wages of those engaged in preparing materials, as well as those directly employed in our ship words. abandonment has always been followed by general disaster to a'l intere s, except those of the usurer and the s'enif. We reaffirm the policy of appropriating the public lands of the United States to be homesteads for American citizens and set-tlers, not aliens, which the Republican party established in 1862, against the persistent opposition of the Democrats in Congress, and which has brought our great Western domain into such magnificent development. The restoration of unearned land grants to the public domain for the use of actual settlers, which was begun under the administration of President Arthur, should be continued.
