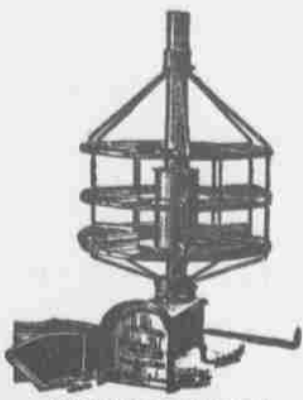

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Ben and Levi—More Election News—Slate Makers—Etc.

BENJAMIN AND LEVI.

Some More States That Go For the Favorites.

WHEELING, W. Va., Nov. 9.—State Treasurer Thompson concedes the state to Harrison. W. T. Hubbard (R.) Congressman-elect, claims Harrison has 2,700 Republican plurality and that the state elects a solid republican delegation to Congress.

HALTFOED, Nov. 9.—There is much excitement over the announcement that the Republican State Central Committee claims the state in doubt due to glaring frauds that have been discovered. The republicans claim that the result is in favor of Harrison. The fraud is claimed to be in New London county.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—A special Washington dispatch to the Mail and Express, claims a 2,000 plurality in Virginia for Harrison, and says five Republican congressmen will be declared elected, as they will have good grounds for contest, and with a republican house, are certain to have a fair count.

The Slate Makers.

BOSTON, Nov. 9.—The slate makers have been busy all day over prognostications from Washington. It is insisted that Edmunds will be attorney-general. A new candidate, however, has arisen in the person of General Butler. His friends claim that his taking the stump for Harrison and throwing over to him the Butler vote particularly in New York and Michigan gave these states to Harrison and demands a fitting reward.

A report says that Mrs. Blaine is opposed to her husband taking the State department as she does not care to go back to Washington after having been so disappointed four years ago and after making such preparations for the occupancy of the White House. She is socially ambitious however, and is trying to persuade him to accept the British Ministry instead.

The Next House.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Reports from Congressional circles make it reasonably sure that the republicans will have in the next House a majority ranging from five to fifteen in several districts, probably the 5th of Maryland, third and fourth of Virginia, and the first district in Arkansas, there will be contest. West Virginia is the only state that now remains in doubt; it may be two weeks before the returns are received from the back counties. The mountain districts are not penetrated by railroads or telegraph, and hide paths form the only means of communication with the outside world.

The Whitechapel Fiend.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The murder fiend added another to his list of victims. At 11 o'clock this morning the body of a woman cut into pieces was discovered in a house on Dorset street, Spitsfields. The police are endeavoring to track the murderer with blood-hounds. The remains were mutilated in the same horrible manner as those of the woman murdered in Whitechapel.

Heavy Snow Storm.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 9.—The heaviest snow storm ever known at this season of the year began at 3 o'clock this morning. It is still raging with unabated violence. The storm is general over the state.
