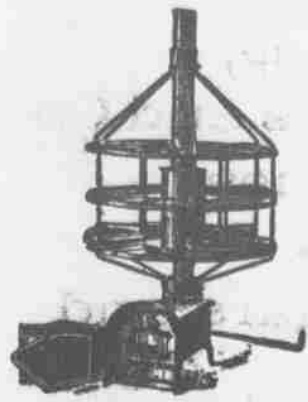

News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

Snow is reported to be ten inches deep in Crook county.

Walla Walla is organizing another building and loan association.

Ashland is soon to have electric lights, to be run by water power.

Several new cases of scarlet fever have broken out in Eugene the past week.

At Tillamook there are thousands of feet of fir lumber drifting up on the beach from the wrecked bark Makah.

A great many immigrants are arriving daily and most of them are pretty well fixed financially from all appearances.

It is rumored that an effort will be made at the next legislature to have the state purchase and control the canal and locks at Oregon City.

Malheur county has not been visited by the beautiful snow. The weather is beautiful and business is good at the county seat and other towns of the county.

Albany's city council is holding special meetings to consider proposed amendments to the city charter, preparatory to the presentation of the same to the next legislature.

Everywhere smallpox is abating. Even Portland has less cases than at any recent date. Up and down the valley not nearly so many cases are reported and the scare, it is thought is about over.

There is quite a smallpox scare at Coburg, caused by a train man on the narrow gauge breaking out with the smallpox while on the train. He had been in Portland attending his wife, who had the disease.

The Astoria and South Coast railroad company have completed the specifications for the bridge across Youngs river and as soon as they are approved by the war department, the contract will be let. The grading contracts will probably be let at the same time.

Four years ago S. P. Sladden came to this state and purchased a piece of land near Eugene City. The land was uncultivated and had to be cleared. Now he holds the medal on fruit grown on that same ground, which four years ago was cleared and set out in trees. Just that circumstance demonstrates what can be accomplished in this state in the fruit line.

The Portland Chinese business men and merchants have united and are giving the authorities every assistance in their power to accomplish the work of breaking up all high-binder societies. The name of every high-binder society with its location were given and the war of extermination will soon commence. The Chinamen are all agreed that active steps should be taken at once. Notices will be posted on every door of these high-binder headquarters ordering them to disband within five days.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Quay Wants Virginia.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Senator Quay has decided to make a fight in the courts for the electoral vote of Virginia which he believes honestly belongs to the republicans. The vote of Virginia is not necessary, but if it belongs to the republicans he desires that they should have it. That all there is about it, and good citizens everywhere should give him their moral support in his efforts to secure an honest count of the vote cast in Virginia. Honest men never fear the most rigid investigation, in the courts or elsewhere of their actions.

He Didn't Sign It.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The President did not sign a bill which was sent to him in the last days of the last session of Congress. The bill permitted persons who have abandoned and relinquished their homestead entries to make another entry. The measure was got through the senate and house and sent to the president, but he allowed it to fall of becoming a law for want of his signature. Senator Dolph proposes to re-introduce the bill and secure its passage; if possible, through the senate at an early day.

Murderer Hye.

WALLA WALLA, Dec. 4.—In the Hye case his attorneys submitted a proposal that the prisoner plead guilty of manslaughter in killing Peter Moritz, so that sentence on both charges may be made at the same time. If this case is not accepted argument on a motion for a new trial will be made.

The Senate Bill.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—When the tariff bill was taken up Harris, of Tennessee, moved to lay on the table the amendment to the house bill proposed by the committee on finance, which is the whole senate bill, and demanded yeas and nays. The motion was rejected by a strict party vote. Yeas 19, nays 29.

A Railroad Disaster.

YOUNGSTOWN N. J., Dec. 5.—This morning on the Lakeport road a mixed passenger train collided with a freight, while both were running forty miles an hour. Both engines and ten cars were wrecked.

A Modest Loan.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Raymond Heath conservative, yesterday said that he believed that the government would at the next session of parliament ask for a loan of £10,000, to be devoted to strengthening the navy.

The entertainment given last night by Miss Shuart, ably assisted by the members of her class and others, attracted quite a body of listeners to the University chapel last evening. Each number is deserving of a more extended notice than can here be given. Miss Mary Childers gave a very pleasing rendition of Tennyson's "Bugle Song," in which she displayed much ability.
