OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

G. W. Sappington of North Yamhill was yesterday granted a notary's seal.

A Josephine county man this year raised 700 bushels of potatoes to the acre.

Astoria requires a policeman to keep order at the Salvation Army barracks.

It is estimated that \$1,000,000 were staked on the result of the election on the Pacific coast alone.

Wm. L. Long, postmaster of Cherryville, was convicted of illegally using postage stamps and fined \$75.

Among the 110 vagrants and petty thieves in the Portland jail during the last month, eighty-five were under twenty-two years of age.

The state board of immigration is going to expend \$2,000 right away in advertising Oregon in eastern papers, notably those of Kansas City.

It is said that an attempt will be made at the next session of the Idaho legislature to change the capital from Boise City to Pocatello or Halley.

A carload of fruit trees have recently been received at Roseburg. People of all Western Oregon are planting trees, and the business cannot be well overdone.

The incorporation yesterday of the Brownsville woolen mill means that the old trouble has been settled and the mill will probably not be sold on the 20th as intended.

People generally are beginning to realize that a large city is to be built on Bellingham harbor, and the fifty new buildings in course of erection give some foundation for that belief.

Messrs. O'Connor & Barr state that if Albany will give them an exclusive franchise for twenty-five years they will build, equip and operate a street railway in that city.

Articles incorporating the Chilcar Canning Co. of Astoria were filed with the secretary of state yesterday. The capital stock is \$20,000 and D. Morgan, B. A. Sabory and Hugh Murray the incorporators.

At Yaquina the work of dumping rock on the south jetty will be continued all winter. Twenty thousand tons additional rock will be placed along that jetty. The present crew handle about 4,000 tons of rock a month.

Rumor has it that a case of smallpox has made its appearance in Monroe. One of their citizens returned from a trip to Portland a short time ago and the latter part of last week broke out with eruption all over his face.

The Board of Trade of Hanford will send Harrison a monster sweet potato. The potato measures 27 1/2 inches long, is 1 1/2 in circumference, weighs seventeen pounds and is as smooth and handsome as it is large and kingly in proportions.

It is currently reported that there are many cases of smallpox in Seattle, but the authorities are very reticent, neither affirming nor denying the rumors. Some claim that two cases were hauled through the streets to the pesthouse. The reports have created much excitement, but it is not thought the disease will cause an epidemic.

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Clarkson's Denial.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—A reporter called on J. S. Clarkson and asked what truth there was in the report that he had been tendered the position of secretary of the Interior. Mr. Clarkson said: "If it is worth while to deny any such improbable rumor you may say there is no truth in it whatever. I have not been tendered that or any other position by President-elect Harrison, nor had any communication nor conversation with him on any subject."

The Fast Train.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—The first new Golden Gate "special train" which is to run between Omaha and San Francisco in sixty hours, making one round trip each week, made good time on its first trip. It is a solid vestibule train of sleeping cars and a dining car, and has among other novelties a barber shop and bath rooms for ladies and gentlemen. The train is heated by steam from the locomotive, and lighted by electricity.

Railroads for Australia.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Joseph Evans, the millionaire, who has been making a tour of inspection of car factories, stopped here on his way homeward to the Pacific coast. Evans is interested in a new railroad in Australia, and says a number of New York capitalists have expressed a desire to invest in the road.

Benjamin and Levi.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 6.—It is expected that Levi P. Morton, vice-president-elect, will be in Indianapolis early next week to call on Gen. Harrison. He will probably be accompanied by his wife and two or three prominent republicans of New York.

A New Navy Yard.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The secretary of the navy appointed Capt. W. T. Mahan, Commander C. M. Chester and Lieut.-Commander C. H. Stockton a board to select a site for a navy-yard on the northwest coast of the United States.

Wants to Fight Sullivan.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 6.—Dominick McCaffrey has challenged John L. Sullivan to fight to a finish under London prize ring rules within two months at or near New York.

Wholesale Suicide.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Four men, three Germans and a Frenchman, attempted suicide in this city this morning. One died immediately and the others will die.

Gould and His Millions.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—It is rumored in the board of trade that Jay Gould has secured a controlling interest in the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad.
