OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

The postal department has granted Spokane Falls and Walla Walla free mail delivery.

The entire yield of hops for the state is estimated at between 12,000 and 20,000 bales.

Wakwakum county is the smallest county in Washington Territory. It contains 150 square miles of land.

A bill has been introduced in this session of congress providing for the division of California into two states.

O. P. Bendsley's crop of 45,000 pounds of hops which he sold for \$8,500, was raised on twenty-one acres of ground.

Diphtheria is raging in the town of Bloomville, Cal. A number of deaths have occurred and the schools have been closed.

At the last session of congress a bill was passed for the establishment of six life-saving stations on the Pacific coast, four of which are to be on the coast of Oregon and Washington Territory.

The last act in the removal of the county seat of Yamhill county will take place on the 7th of January, when the records will be removed from Lafayette and placed in the new court house at McMinnville.

For several weeks the Linn county treasury has been empty and the county was compelled to borrow \$2500 for running expenses. About \$8000 in taxes collected by the sheriff has been turned over to the treasurer and the county is again in funds.

Geo. Sutton, a first-class miner, and an old resident of Silver City, Idaho, returned there last week from an Alaskan tour of a year or more. He comes back fully impressed that there are better mining countries, at least for miners, than Alaska.

Al. W. Herren will take about sixty sheep to Portland from Salem for Christmas. Some of them will weigh as high as 250 pounds. This is remarkable weight for sheep. Last year Mr. Herren finished some sheep that weighed as high as 222 pounds.

By a Direct Vote.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Representative Stone of Kentucky introduced a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing that the President and Vice-President be chosen every fourth year by the direct votes of the people.

A paragraph of the joint resolution forbids the holding of any local or State elections, except for members of Congress, on the day set apart for the election of President and Vice-President. The election is to take place on the first Tuesday of November.

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

A Coast Representative.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—There have been two names suggested since the meeting of Congress as men eminently qualified to fill Cabinet offices in case General Harrison should determine to give the Pacific Coast a representative. They are Charles N. Felton, of San Francisco, present representative from the Fifth district of that State, and Joseph N. Dolph, Senator from Oregon.

Senator Dolph would make an admirable Secretary of the Interior, but his chances for continuing in his present position are so good that he would doubtless be reluctant to resign the Senatorship to go into Harrison's Cabinet.

A Shooting Affray.

EUGENE, Dec. 7.—News was received here Wednesday evening that a shooting affray had taken place near Florence, Sunday forenoon last, in which Frank Rawlings, a young unmarried man of 35 years of age was probably fatally shot by W. H. Harrington a man of about 60 years of age. The news was confirmed by Constable D. P. Shepherd arriving Thursday morning with the man Harrington, who had done the shooting, turning him over to the custody of Sheriff Sloan.

A Constellation of Authors.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Joaquin Miller, Edward Everett Hale, Lew Wallace, Maurice Thompson and Franklin File have agreed to write five associated works of fiction, to appear in January. The profits of the publication will be equally divided. Miller will write of early California days. Hale will locate his story in New England, Thompson in St. Louis, and File writes about New York City.

A Call for Militia.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Dec. 7.—Governor Morehouse received a telegram from Sheriff Myda this afternoon informing him that he is powerless to control the outlaws of the coal strikers at Beaver. He invokes the aid of the militia, and urges the governor to send militia to preserve the peace and protect the lives and property of the citizens.

Change of Venue.

PORTLAND, Dec. 7.—The attorneys for three condemned Chinese murderers now lying in the county jail, who were granted a new trial by the supreme court, made a motion for a change of venue, claiming that last Sunday's shooting affair had stirred up prejudice against them. The motion will be argued.

Taken to the Asylum.

SPOKANE FALLS, Dec. 7.—Major George W. Barter, late managing editor of the Review, left to-day for Stellacoom, where he will be placed in charge of the asylum authorities for treatment. His friends believe that a few weeks of rest and quiet in that retreat will restore his mental balance.

Freezing to Death.

QUEBEC, Dec. 7.—The bodies of three persons out of the five who left Gaspe basin in a small boat for Dartmouth river, last week, have been found in the boat, frozen stiff. The other two who refused to continue the trip after starting, were saved.

He Was Guilty.

BAKER CITY, Dec. 7.—The jury in the case of the state vs. Arthur Hallam, for the murder of Bud Douglas at Craker City last September, returned a verdict of manslaughter. Hallam will be sentenced to-day.

Oil Well Lines.

LIMA, O., Dec. 7.—The Standard Oil Company will soon begin the construction of a pipeline from this city to St. Louis for the transportation of oil for distribution over the Southern and Southwestern States.
