#### Statistics of Prunes.

Mr. Lewelling weighed the fruit from a lot of German prune trees, eight years old, and they averaged one hundred pounds per tree. This was not an extraordinary yield. One-sixty trees to the acre would make a return of \$160 for the fruit sold at the canneries. If dried, the returns would be more. The German prune is not so profitable as the Silver prune, or the Italian and its sub-variety, the Golden.

One man can cultivate twenty acres planted to pears or prunes, and will require help only in harvesting. An average annual return of \$100 per acre is a modest estimate based on prices for fruits in home market. A heavy per cent, may be added to this if the fruit is shipped,
