Happenings Over the City and News From the Country Roundabout.

Trouble on the Oregon Pacific.

About 300 laborers, who had been working for Jacobs & Neugass on the Oregon Pacific railroad, were in Albany yesterday, says the Herald, having come down Christmas night.

On arriving there a committee of laborers waited upon Vice-President Wallis Nash to ascertain if the \$8000 due them from Jacobs & Neugass could be secured.

The plant and supplies of Jacobs & Neugass have been attached by Portland creditors. This failure has caused a scare among creditors, and attachments have also been levied by Portland creditors and by Stewart & Sox and Wallace, Thompson & Co., of Albany, on the plant of Searles & Dean.

The failure has filled Albany with idle men, who have been thrown out of employment.

What Cherries to Plant.

The sweet cherries, Hearts and Bigarons, having firm flesh, can be shipped a long distance and they retain their flavor better than any other fruit in drying.

By planting cherries of the different classes the season may be prolonged for two months in this valley. May Duke, Early Purple, Goigne and Knight's Early Black are among the earliest.

Statistics of Prunes.

Mr. Lewelling weighed the fruit from a lot of German prune trees, eight years old, and they averaged one hundred pounds per tree. This was not an extraordinary yield.

One man can cultivate twenty acres planted to pears or prunes, and will require help only in harvesting. An average annual return of \$100 per acre is a modest estimate based on prices for fruits in home market.

A Drunken Brawl at Gervais.

Yesterday's stabbing affray at Gervais may possibly result in the death of Robert Krebs, one of the participants. It appears that Krebs, whose home is at Brooks, was drinking in a saloon at Gervais with Charles Atwood, section boss on the O. & C. road, when they commenced disputing with each other over their respective physical powers.

After giving Atwood a severe beating Krebs started back to Gervais but on reaching the road turned around and returned to the field where the other men had remained. He says that three men then assaulted him. He held them at bay for a time by striking at them with his pistol, but they finally overpowered him and Atwood stabbed him in the abdomen with a knife.

At the preliminary examination conducted at Gervais yesterday evening before J. S. Purdom, justice of the Peace, Charles Atwood and William Holtzclaw were bound over, charged with assault with intent to kill, to await the action of the grand jury.

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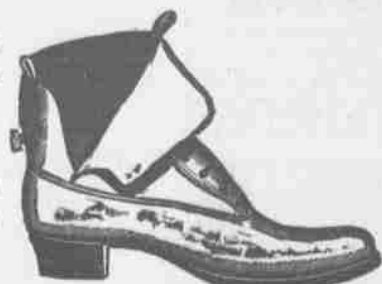
