PROCEEDINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

The City Axtions for a New Bridge—Will Try and Compromise a Damage Case—Bills Allowed

Last evening the city council met in regular session, his honor Mayor Williams presiding, and present Councilmen Gray, Collins, Lafore, Strang, Edes and Hutton, Recorder Conn, City Marshal Ross, Street Commissioner Graham and City Surveyor Gesner.

Committee on ways and means again asked for further time to make a report.

Committee on accounts and current expenses reported favorably on the following bills:

Committee on streets and public property reported their recommendation for the construction of an alley sewer through block 36, and it was ordered that bids for the same be advertised; the committee also recommended the building of a cross-walk at Chemeketa and Front streets as petitioned for.

Thomas Holman made application for a license to run a ferry on the old ferry site. Referred to the committee.

The following bills against the city were read and referred to the proper committee to audit, except the bills of Archie Mason and Jos. Benoit which were ordered paid under suspension of rules.

W. H. Holmes was present and addressed the council regarding the injuries sustained by Irving Claggett last summer by an awning falling upon him. Mr. Holmes stated that Mr. Claggett was willing to settle the matter in the right way and thought it would be more pleasant to settle between themselves than to proceed to law about the matter. The council empowered Mayor Williams to do what he could to settle the matter with Mr. Claggett as he might consider for the best interest of the city.

Contractor J. E. McCoy being present, was invited to state to the council anything he might have to say regarding the rebuilding of the Salem bridge. Mr. McCoy stated that he had succeeded in locating the three large spans, but was unable to find the small span. The first span was located on Kaiser Bottom, second span at Lincoln and the third span about one mile below Wheatland, and said that it was covered over by a large amount of drift wood. He stated that he made an examination of these spans and found them in better condition than he anticipated; that the larger timbers were all sound and not damaged much; that at a small expense all the costly irons could be fixed as good as the day they left the foundry. Mr. McCoy said he had been figuring on the cost of rebuilding the bridge by bringing back the old spans. He said that at a rough estimate he thought that \$34,000 would replace the bridge with good substantial piers; the first pier to be 20x60; second, 22x70, and the third 24x80. The second pier to be 50 feet high and all to be protected by a rock ballast. He said that in his opinion the old bridge could be replaced in position at the above sum and could be made much more substantial than before.

The council then signified their desire that Mr. McCoy at an early date submit a proposition to the county court to replace the bridge, and the council adjourned.

INJURED HAND.—A. Benoit, one of the carpenters with the railroad bridge repairing gang, had his hand caught last evening between the lever and walking-beam of a hand-car and the back of the hand was badly lacerated. He was afraid he would be laid up for a time, but he is at work all right again to-day.

FINAL PRIZE.—A. J. Patton and Chas. J. Hall made final proof before the county clerk to-day upon their homesteads, near Silver Creek Falls.

Hon. E. B. McElroy departed yesterday for Corvallis and Independence.

MOTOR WHIST CLUB.—This club held its regular weekly meeting at the residence of Mr. C. L. Keller, last evening, all the members being present but two. About one hour was passed in the game, when a beautiful lunch was served, which all appreciated and did ample justice. This being the evening for monthly report of the treasurer, a lengthy and exhaustive document was read from which it was learned that something less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars was on hand which could be applied on a trip to Europe for the club, or as some more public spirited members suggested, to the building and completion of a free bridge across the Willamette at Salem. Quite a discussion arose as to the proper disposition of the fund, but after an exhaustive consideration of the subject it was finally determined to delay action until the next meeting. The occasion was one of much interest and pleasure, as are all those weekly gatherings of neighbors and friends.

A "CLOCK" OUT OF ORDER.—Geo. Hollister brought down from Stayton yesterday Adam Kloeh, aged about 45 years, whose mind is badly unbalanced through religious excitement. He has been a zealous attendant at a revival which has been going on in that neighborhood some time past and became so worked up on the subject that he is now insane to a high pitch of wildness. His wife is already in the asylum and their four children, the oldest about 15 years old, are stopping with neighboring families, the oldest with his grandfather, Mr. Kippar, of Kippar's bluff. Kloeh was examined in the evening before County Judge Shaw by Drs. Cusick and Richardson and committed to the insane asylum.

DIED IN STOCKTON.—Mrs. George Collins, of this city, received a telegraphic message last evening announcing the death at Stockton, California, of her sister, Mrs. Susie Obermuller, who, with her three children, visited her from April to July last year, and who, with her husband and family, formerly resided on the Collins farm south of this city five or six years. The deceased was about 31 years old and her sister knew nothing of her illness until notified of her death. Mrs. Collins will have the sympathy of the community in her grief.

SPECIAL MEETING.—The Young Men's Investment company met in special session Monday evening and, elected P. A. Wiggins as a director to fill the vacancy of E. A. Strong who recently went east. The absence of Mr. Strong also caused the vacancy of a vice-president and Geo. G. Brown was duly elected as such. The enterprise is in a flourishing condition, and the "boys" are quite jubilant over their success so far. A meeting of all the stockholders is to be held Monday evening next.

HANDSOME RESIDENCE.—Architect C. A. Robert has broken ground and is having lumber and brick delivered for a new residence 30 by 50 feet, cottage style, on the northwest corner of Oak and Summer streets, Albert's addition. It will be built in the most approved style and complete throughout.
