Associated Press Report and Digest of All Important News of To-day.

MISCELLANY.

THE EASTERN RAILROAD STRIKE.
NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 11.—All through the night and early this morning it looked as though the strike on the N. Y. Central was slowly but surely petering out. Nevertheless both parties so far as words went at all events, are stubborn as ever. The Buffalo express or newspaper train moved out on time at 5 a. m., and before seven two trains had been sent out over the Harlem division. Soon after an announcement was made that all trains would be run to-day.
Police arrangements remain the same as Sunday, except that the men are told not to leave their post for even an instant. Vice-president Webb contradicted the statement made last night that the firemen had struck. He declared that all passenger trains would be running fully manned. Everything, he declared, is in the shape all along the road except at Syracuse, where proper protection is not accorded. He had telegraphed Governor Hill for troops and he added that arrangements are being perfected for moving freight to-day. The first freight which has been moved since the strike left the yards for Albany at nine a. m. There was no opposition by strikers, as a heavy guard of police was on hand.

GREAT MEETING OF VETERANS.
BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 11.—Grand Army week opened here with great bustle and excitement. The weather is cool. Large delegations arrived during the early morning and the streets are filled with marching bodies.

AN OREGON MEMBER RESIGNS.
BOSTON, Mass.,—At a meeting of the national council of administration, held with closed doors, the resignation of W. H. Saylor, member from Oregon, was received and accepted. Captain John E. Lombard was elected to his place. Arrivals are increasing hourly.

THE MAILS LONG DELAYED.
NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 11.—Up to noon not a single piece of mail was received from the West over the N. Y. Central. The mail thus delayed was due last night and this morning.

WILL JOIN THE STRIKE.
SCRANTON, Pa., Aug. 11.—General Master Workman Powderly says the New York Central strike will probably be considered at the meeting of the general executive board in Detroit Wednesday. He believes if necessary the brotherhood of locomotive engineers and firemen will join the strike.

ALL QUIET AT DEWITT.
ALBANY, N. Y., Aug 11.—Word is received that everything is quiet at De Witt.

COMING IN LEHIND TIME.
BUFFALO, N. Y., AUG. 11.—The situation on the Central road is unchanged. Trains from the East are coming in several hours late.

AGENTS AND DETECTIVES ASSISTING THE RAILROADS.
CHICAGO, Ills., Aug. 11.—Agents of the N. Y. Central are hiring brakemen and switchmen here and sending them on. The Pinkertons are also hurrying men to guard the Central tracks.

LOOKING FOR WORK.
The 65th street yards from which the first shipment of freight was made, is the most important in the city. The freight train passed Suptey Duvell at 10:30. Everything to that point was all right. There is no excitement around the Grand Central depot except that large numbers are applying for work at the temporary employment bureau.

THE MANAGERS CONFIDENT.
NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—In an interview this morning, Vice-president Webb said "I have every reason to believe neither engineers nor firemen will go out." Every train which left the depot this morning was promptly on time and schedule time will be observed all day.

POLITICAL.

THE STRIKE AND THE PRESIDENCY.
NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—"The strike on the New York Central is bound to be an important factor in the presidential campaign," said William Price, one of the prominent labor leaders last night. "Chauncey Depew will make himself president or will ruin all chances of his ever getting the nomination by his action in this matter."

ACCIDENTS.

COLLISION WITHOUT LOSS OF LIFE.
WATERBURY, N. Y., Aug. 11.—The west bound flyer on the Rome, Waterbury and Ogdensburg railroad this morning collided with freight cars on the siding at Adams Center. Four freight cars, engine, baggage car and the first coach were torn completely away. Not a passenger was injured. The fireman sustained severe injuries.

OTTAWA, CAN., Aug. 11.—Advices have been received by the government from Southern Alberta, the Northwest Territory, to the effect that the Mormons who came into that country from Utah are corrupting the Indians with their doctrines.

HORRIBLE BUTCHERY BY ARABS.

LONDON, Eng., Aug. 11.—An engagement has taken place between a force of the rebel Arabs and the army of the sultan of Morocco. One hundred and twenty prisoners were captured by the rebels and all massacred. Among the captives was a son of the governor of the province in which the uprising took place. Portions of his body were cut off while he was alive and roasted. He was then compelled by the rebels to eat his own flesh.

CHOLERA STILL RAGING IN ARABIA.

CAIRO, Egypt, Aug. 11.—There were one hundred and twenty-six deaths from cholera at Jeddah yesterday and one hundred and eight at Meccen.

NATIONAL ANTI-LOTTERY LEGISLATION.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 11.—In the senate the committee on postoffice and post roads to-day ordered an anti-lottery bill to be reported to the senate with recommendation that it pass.
