Dependency over this is supposed to have been the cause of his act. The coroner's jury found a verdict in accordance with the above facts.

### REVOLUTION IN MEXICO.

#### Mexican on Both Sides the Border Favor It.

MONTREY, Mexico, Jan. 3.—Evidence in the shape of a secret pronouncement is distributed among those believed to be friendly to the cause, which charges Diaz and his cabinet with exercising arbitrary power for their private benefit, after having demoralized the nation with their system of terrorism, subordination and assassination, and that the integrity of the nation has been so compromised that the American congress has appointed a deputy with sufficient funds for the purchase of Lower California the same as one would make a proposition to buy savage islands in the ocean. The audacity and cynicism of President Diaz have been carried to such an extreme as to bring about his indefinite reelection, therefore he is disowned and pronounced a traitor to his country. His secretary of state and governors and military authorities who take up arms against the new movement will be considered traitors and punished accordingly.

The Mexican nation is declared to be in a state of siege and the Mexican people are summoned to Mexico. Catarina Garza is to be known as supreme chief of the army, though by reason of government persecution he will not appear at the head of the vanguard of revolution for some time. Upon taking possession of the capital of the republic, Garza will call a general election for a constitutional convention, which will proceed to revise the constitution of 1857, and, when the revolution has been triumphant and the new government established, all trammels to industry and commerce will be removed, true sovereignty given to the states and independence to the municipalities. Suffrage shall be free, and no re-election of presidents. The pronouncement is signed by Prudevilco Gonzales and 195 others.

### THE MOVEMENT IS GROWING.

RIO GRANDE CITY, Tex., Jan. 3.—There is no longer any doubt that the present movement is going to continue to grow in size and importance until the Mexican government will find it exceedingly difficult to overcome it. This place is in the very center of the revolutionary sentiment, and there are not half a dozen Mexicans or Americans here exclusive of the troops, who are not secretly in sympathy with the movement. The fact that the reserve roster of the so-called army of Catalina Garza, which was captured by Captain John C. Bourke several months ago, had upon it the names of 80 men of Rio Grande City, who could be depended upon to join the revolution when the proper time arrived, shows the existing feeling. It is the same way throughout Starr Zapata, Hidalgo, Nueces and Webb counties, and it estimated that there are fully 8000 Mexicans on this side of the border who are giving the active instigators of the present revolution every secret assistance in their power. This fact accounts, in a large measure, for the difficulty the United States troops meet in trailing the bandits on this side. The opinion is general here that it will be only a short time until the revolutionary leaders will be fully matured to make a bold and united invasion of Mexico. There are already several detachments of revolutionists on Mexican soil, and they are gathering large numbers of recruits from all parts of Mexico, particularly in Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas. The fact that General Estrada, one of the most efficient commanders in the Mexican army, has deserted and joined the revolutionists, has a decidedly stimulating effect upon the cause.

### The Sandwich Islands.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—If the statement of Commodore J. S. Skerrett is correct, a conflict between the government of this country and that of Great Britain for the possession of the Sandwich Islands is not out of the range of possibilities. The commodore arrived at the Palmer house Monday, en route to San Francisco to take charge of the Mohican. "It is probable," he said, that the vessel will be ordered to Honolulu shortly, owing to discontent among the inhabitants of the islands named. If the change to the present rule is to take place, there is a strong movement to place the islands under the government of the United States, while at the same time there is a section which

### National Politics.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Chairman of the Republican national committee telegraphed his friends in Oregon that under no circumstances could his name be presented for election. It means that he gives up all hope of electing a Republican senator there. Carter has also given up California and Wyoming.

The relations between Cleveland and Whitney are strained. Whitney wants Murphy for senator. Whitney is a tammany man because his relations in New York compel him to stand in with Tammany. Cleveland fears Whitney is so largely interested in protected industries that if he is allowed to influence the next administration he will prevent the changes which have been determined upon.

### A HEAVY BILL.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 3.—The biennial message of Governor Pattison was read in both branches of the legislature today. It cost the state \$400,000 to put down Home-land insurrection. The Governor says the sheriff did not try to put it down and the country ought to stand cool.

### Ohio Politics.

COLUMBUS, Jan. 3.—Governor McKinley in his annual message to the legislature reviews the financial condition of the state, which shows a deficit of \$99,888. He recommends that the voice of the people, demanding reform in municipal government, be heeded.

### New York.

ALBANY, Jan. 3.—Legislature convened at noon. Wm. Sulzer of New York was made speaker. Gov. Flower's message was read to both houses and adjournment taken for a week. The governor's statement of finances showed the state owed \$450,000, and had a balance of \$1,701,487 in treasury. Buffalo strike cost the state \$192,647.

### Blaine Worse.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 3.—Blaine's condition has taken a backward turn, but the change will probably not be of a character to excite serious apprehension. Patient has been suffering from constipation the past two days.

### Vary Cold.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 3.—The temperature in this state this morning is from 10 to 14 degrees below zero.

### In Close Quarters.

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 3.—If Republicans can succeed in filibustering all afternoon they will only lack two votes of a majority in the lower house by 6 o'clock tonight. Last night County Clerk Vancamp, of Knox county, was captured by a messenger from the supreme court and rendered a canvass of returns of Knox and Boyd counties. Vancamp had already issued a certificate of election to Kruse, Populist, for house. Last night he issued a second certificate of election to Chester Northern, Republican. The messenger is now hurrying to Lincoln with certificate by stage and train but can't reach here before 6 tonight.

### North Dakota.

BISMARCK, Jan. 3.—Chief interested in the session of the North Dakota legislature which convened today arrives in contest for successor to United States Senator Casey. Republicans have a clear majority and the result hinges on the decision of party caucus. It is alleged by some opponents Casey made overtures to Democrats and called attention of the matter to Cleveland. Later it is said he refused to have anything to do with it, saying his party could not afford to run the risk of being charged with corruption, and advising election of a clean Republican as possible. It seems likely Casey will be elected in the end.

### Tascott Not the Man Who Killed Millionaire Snell.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—A morning paper has an interview with Detective Dyer, who probably knows more than any body else regarding the murder of A. J. Snell, the millionaire, of this city. The interview grew out of the statement telegraphed from the West that Jules Beauvis, a miner, recently returned from Alaska, declared that W. B. Tascott, for whose arrest as Snell's murderer a big reward at one time was offered, was there. Dyer declares that Tascott is not the murderer of Snell, but consented to act the part of scapegoat in order to shield the man who did it and who is a prominent man still in Chicago, and who has spent a fortune in covering up his crime. Dyer declares Beauvis knew Tascott in Chicago, and therefore should know what he is talking about. He says the real murderer hired Tascott to go with him to rob the Snell residence; that Snell heard them and came down stairs, and that the man mentioned killed him. Tascott, he declares, could have been arrested many times over if he really was wanted.

### The Cholera.

HAMBURG, Jan. 3.—Several new cases of cholera are reported today.
