Clearing Houses Issue a Circulating Medium.

BIG SOUTHERN BANK FAILURE.

Strike On All the Great Sugar Refineries.

New York, June 15.—In view of serious drain upon banks here, caused by the demands from interior, the clearing house committee proposes that every clearing house center in the country issue clearing house certificates, which would make available for use between banks a vast amount of perfectly good assets, which are now uncurrent. In opinion of sagacious and conservative bank officers of this city it would be a long step toward restoration of confidence.

Trainrobber Halted.

Fort Gibson, I. T., June 15.—Henry Starr, a notorious train robber and bank wrecker, is surrounded by deputy marshals and a sheriff's posse at a point 20 miles from Nowatack the bandit's home. Unless the posse weakens, Starr will be taken either dead or alive. The reward of \$1500 is incentive to great activity by officers. Starr has six men.

Today's Failures.

ARKANSAS CITY, Ark., June 15.—The First National bank of this city, one of the oldest and generally believed to be the strongest financial institutions of the southwest, failed to open its doors this morning. Deposits reported \$600,000.

St. Louis, June 15.—S. Bonham, banker, Fairfield, Ill., has failed.

WEXTON, Ohio, June 15.—The Exchange banking company of this place has closed its doors, owing to a run.

ANDERSON, Ind., June 15.—The Farmers' and Merchants' State bank at Fairmount, Grant county, has closed. Quite a number of farmers threatened to use dynamite and blow up the bank. It had a paid up capital of \$50,000.

Sugar Strike.

BROOKLYN, June 15.—The immense sugar refineries of the Havemeyers in Williamsburg have stopped work in consequence of striking of firemen for shorter hours. The strike will spread to all other refineries in this neighborhood.

THE BARK SEA RANGER.

Wrecked and Lost off the Coast of Alaska.

PORT TOWNSEND, June 15.—The Whaling Bark Sea Ranger, Captain Charles H. Foley of San Francisco, was wrecked May 24 on a hidden ledge three miles west of Kyak island, off the coast of Alaska. The vessel and cargo, consisting of train oil and whale oil, valued at \$11,000 are a total loss. The crew barely escaped from the sinking vessel in time to save their lives. Officers and part of crew arrived from Sitka this morning by steamer City of Topeka. Particulars of disaster as related by Capt. Foley are as follows: "James McKee, seaman, died May 20, when we were becalmed 19 miles from land. I wore ship in shore to land to bury the corpse. We were about to drop anchor at a place where the chart indicated nineteen fathoms when bark struck a hidden rock and smashed the keel. The vessel listed to port and rapidly filled. I hardly had time to lowboats to take crew and corpse off when she sank. After some difficulty a landing was made at a trading post of the North American Commercial Co. on Kyak island.

Notorious Train Robber at Bay—The De Lesseps Released. WHILE IN PRISON. NIARAGA FALLS, June 15.—Simon Mahony, a gold cure patient, killed his

two brothers, Cornelius and James, last evening, while temporarily in prison.

De Lesseps Free.

PARIS, June 15.—Considerable excitement has been caused by a decision of the court of session on appeal of Charles De Lesseps and other defendants, convicted of fraud in connection with the Panama canal court. It handed down a decision today, quashing sentences on the ground of statute of limitations. It covered offenses charged and that indictments on which prisoners were tried, are irregular. Following were those convicted: Ferdinand De Lesseps, his son Charles, Marius Fontane, Henry Cottu and Gustave Eiffel. Ferdinand De Lesseps was sentenced to five years imprisonment and to pay a fine.

Parliamentary Elections.

BERLIN, June 15.—Elections are being held in Germany today. Almost tropical weather prevails everywhere in the country, which will bring out a heavy vote in the rural districts. In Berlin is utter absence of excitement. Street are wearing every day appearance. The wealthy classes appear apathetic as to outcome. At noon workmen left factories and walked in groups to voting stations and deposited ballots. Socialists are displaying more activity than any other political groups, a number women distributing electoral tickets. All postoffice employees are given leave of absence to vote.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 15.—The tenth day of the Borden trial opened with a big crowd. The prisoner is overwhelmed with floral offerings and appeared in excellent spirits, despite the seeming disheartening proceedings of yesterday. The commonwealth rested its case.

Electric Failure.

SEATTLE, June 15.—The Rainier Electric Railway and Power Co. and Seattle Consolidated Street Railway Co. has gone into the hands of a receiver, through failure to dispose of bonds. D. T. Denny, principal owner, to protect all his creditors, has given trust deeds, deeds and mortgages on all his property. His assets are much larger than liabilities.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—The trial of J. W. Flood, charged with embezzlement of \$164,000, from the Donahue-Kelley Banking Co., closed today and the jury retired.

RUSSIAN MONASTERY ROBBED.

MONKS Arrested and Valuables Found—Women in the Case.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 15.—The church Chudov Monastery, which is within the walls of the Kremlin, was recently robbed of a vast amount of plate, money and gems, valued between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 roubles. Today all the monks belonging to the monastery were arrested and a search of their cells revealed that they had perpetrated the robbery. The charges of burglary has been made against the monks, the crime is punishable by a most severe penalty. A number of women have been living secretly with the monks.
