THE ST. LOUIS REPUBLIC, the foremost champion of free coinage of silver in the Mississippi valley, in a long article advising the Democratic state convention of Missouri, says:

"Free coinage of silver is a restoration of bimetalism. We cannot hide the fact that it would be a silver monometallism whose sudden coming would break contracts, prostrate confidence and exile enterprises. We would have all the difficulties of Mexico and Guatemala, without the advantage they derive from never having altered their silver coinage. They have gradually come to a silver monometallism in which their dollar counts in debt payments for only half what it did twenty years ago. We would make the present change in days, and no nation ever can have financial buoyancy enough to stand such a change without convulsion and panic."

This paper sees that it is absurd and impossible to coin fifty cents worth of bullion into a dollar worth one hundred cents without breaking contracts,




