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A STRAWBERRY SHOW.

Rules and Classes Arranged by the
Strawberry Committee.

Messrs. C. B. Moore, J. M. Kyley and
E. H. Miller, the committee named Monday
to arrange a premium list for
exhibits of strawberries in connection
with the Rose Fair to be held at Salem,
Friday June 1, and decided on a list
of prizes which are given below.
The aggregate amount of money to
be given for the premiums is \$5.
There are eight classes in which
berries may be entered, each class having
a first and second premium.

The committee also formulated rules
for governing the exhibits of strawberries.

The amount of each premium is sufficient
to encourage the growers to give
special attention to the matter of ex-
hibit and there is every reason to believe
the strawberry section of the fair
will be one of the leading attractions
for the public.
