THE RIOTING IN CHINA

Mobs Are Led by the Leading Viceroy.

THE MISSIONARIES ARE ALL SAFE

But the Mission Property Is Completely Destroyed.

New York, June 11.—The following cablegram from Rev. J. R. Hikes, at Shanghai, has been received at the office of the Methodist missionary society in this city.

LONDON, June 11.—According to a special dispatch from Shanghai the loss of property as a result of the recent rioting at Cheng Tu, Katung and Ho Ching amount to several million dollars.

It is stated at the legation that Cheng Tu is a large city in the interior of China. The people are far removed from the centers of foreign commerce.

The missionaries are the only foreigners who have heretofore settled in Cheng Tu. Their number is not known.

The Chinese government has asked foreign governments to appreciate these difficulties and has advised that the missionaries should be kept within safe limits.

The Official Gazette of China, recently received here, shows that the change had been made in the viceroys at Cheng Tu.

THE JAPS IN FORMOSA. YOKOHAMA, June 11.—An official dispatch from the island of Formosa announces that the Japanese imperial guard occupied Taipei Fu on June 7.

THE MUTES AND BLIND.

To Be Kept in Separate Institutions—New Appointees.

Governor Lord, Secretary Kincaid, and Superintendent Irwin were in session Monday at the State Board Education.

After discussing at length the former plan of consolidating and economizing in the management of the blind and mute schools, it was decided to separate the schools and place the mutes in the farm building, as originally intended.
