"I read a few days ago," he said, "that the value of the exports from this country is 1895 was \$100,000,000 less than in the year before. Now, what are the exports? If I remember correctly, the shipments of live cattle and dressed beef were valued at \$50,000,000 for the year before reciprocity was repealed. Since then the Wilson tariff has been passed, and the shipments of dressed beef alone to the New England states have decreased 560,000 cattle, while the number of live cattle exported has fallen off more than one-

"What does this mean to the farmer?" Mr. Allerton was asked.

"Although there are 600,000 less cattie than in 1893, and fewer hogs, the prices have steadily fallen until the price has reached \$1 less per hundred pounds. To restore reciprocity and open the markets of the world would give immediate relief, because all legit imate foreign exchange is made out of the sale of our cotton, live cattle, dressed beef, sheep, canned good, and farm products.

Mr. Allerton goes on to say that congress should try to do something at once for the relief of the country before going into another long debate on the tariff; and the easiest and best way to meet the situation is the re-enactment of reciprocity. Reciprocity, he says, will be the keynote of the next campaign. In conclusion, he says:


