CORPORATION PROPERTY REDUCED

While Marion County Gets a Raise, as Usual.

The figures given below as the work of the state board of equalization are not the final equalization as it will stand, but simply changes in two classes. The figures are prepared by a reporter on the Statesman who is clerk of the board and are probably correct.

The above figures mean a reduction principally on corporation property of \$2,200,000. The gentlemen have certainly earned the thanks of the corporations and paid well for their railroad passes.

There is absolutely no truth in the above statement of causes that led my daughter to commit suicide. There is no question in my mind but what it was written for the purpose of injuring myself and family. The writer knows that the article is a manufactured mass of deliberate falsehoods, hence he dates it at Turner and dare not sign his name.

It is true that I objected to my daughter keeping company with a certain young man but I did so because that young man had himself told me stories of his past life that rendered him unfit to associate with a respectable girl. I did not, however, try to force my daughter to go with any one. She was 16 years old, an age at which every girl requires careful guardianship, and it was my right and duty to see that proper supervision was kept over her, particularly in regard to her associates.

As to her faring punishment for disobeying me, I have never struck my children a blow during their lifetime, but have ruled them by kindness alone, and for two years a Lily has been an object of especial care, owing to an accidental injury received by her. I have been a resident of this vicinity for several years, and I do not think the insinuations or falsehoods of a person who is ashamed to sign his name can injure me, but I wish this statement published to correct a false impression in the minds of those who are not familiar with the circumstances.
