THE JOURNAL prints the record of the last legislature were \$10,000 less tion. than its predecessor, and its total appropriations \$600,000 less. The general appropriation bill of 1895 was \$1,257,435.99. For 1893 the general appropriation bill was \$1,497,885.57, or \$240,000 more than 1895-the worst lied about legislature in history.

The Populist Salem Post printed the other day the statement that the expense for clerkhire in the last legislature was \$4,004.41 less than in 1893. This would leave the record of legislature over its predecessor something like this:
