Mr. Simon worked the primaries at Portland for his masters Scott, Corbett and Falling this year just as he has always done for twenty years. Corbett and Failing with Scott own the only daily newspaper there, and of course it upholds Simon's work. That paper charges all the corruption of the primaries upon the Frank-Hume-Minto faction. He has the right under that law to appoint all the judges and clerks, designate the hours and places of holding primary election, the ballots are not required to be preserved, the lists certified by his officers are final, and they can throw out any ballots they please. No state has such a law. He violates the state law in having only eleven polling places for 15,000 voting population, when there should be one voting place for each 250 voters.
