

It is not only un-American, but anti-American, and it can be fastened on the United States only by the stifling of that spirit and love of liberty which proclaimed our political inde-pendence in 1776 and won in the war of the revolution.

FREE COINAGE. We demand the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the aid or consent of any other nation. We demand that the standard silver dollar shall be a full legal tender, equally with gold, for all debts, public and private, and we favor such legislation as will prevent for the future the demonetization of any kind of legal tender money by private contract.

BONDS. We are opposed to the policy and practice of surrendering to the hold-ers of the obligations, of the United States, the option reserved by law to the government of redeeming such obigations in either silver coin or gold

we are opposed to the issuing of in-terest-bearing bonds of the United States in time of peace, and condemn the trafficking with banking syndicates which, in exchange for bonds and at an enormous profit to themselves, supply the federal treasury with gold to maintain the policy of gold programmed. gold monometallism.

ISSUE OF MONEY.

Congress alone has the power to coin and issue money, and Prerident Jackson declared that this power could not be delegated to corporations or individuals. We therefore de-nounce the issuance of notes intended to circulate as money by national banks as in derogation of the constitution, and we demand that all paper which is made a legal tender for public and private debts or which is receivable for duties to the United States shall be be issued by the gov-ernment of the United States and shall be redeemable in coin.

TARIFF. We hold that tariff duties should be levied for purpose of revenue, such du ties to be so adjusted as to operate equally throughout the country and no discriminate between class or

Until the money question is settled we are opposed to any agitation for further changes in our tariff laws, except such as are necessary to meet the deficit in revenue caused by the adverse decision of the supreme court on the income tax. But for this decision by the suprame court there would be no deficit in the revenue under the law passed by a Demosratic congress in strict pursuance of the uniform decisions of that court for 100 years, that court having in that decision sustained constitutional objections to its enactment witch had preciously been overruled by the ablest judges who have ever sat on the bench. We de-clare that it is the duty of congress to use all the constitutional power which remains after that decision, or which may tome from its reversal by the court as it may hereafter be consti-tuted, so that the burdens of taxation may be equally and impartially laid, to the end that wealth may bear its due proportion of the expense of the government.

LABOR. We hold that the most efficient way of protecting American labor is to prevent the importation of foreign pauper labor to compete with it in the home market, and that the value of the home market to our American farmers and artisans is greatly reduced by a vicious monetary system which depresses the prices of their products below the cost of production, and thus deprives them of the means of pur chasing the products of our home manufactories, and, as labor creates he wealth of the country, we demand

The absorption of wealth by the few, the consolidation of our leading railroad systems, and the formation of trust and pools require a sticter control by the federal government of those arteries of commerce.
