FOREIGN BUDGET

English Jingoism is Rampant.

Claims That the Clan-na-gael is at Work.

LONDON, June 27.—Ambassador Choate had a conference with officials of the foreign office and the marquis of Salisbury today, with regard to the objection raised by Canada on Friday to the proposed modus vivendi in settlement of the Alaskan boundary dispute.

PARIS, June 27.—In the chamber of deputies today, Deroulede, the founder of the so-called league of patriots, introduced a proposal for revision of the constitution with a view of substituting a "popular" or "parliamentary" republic and demanded the urgency for a motion. The premier is opposed to the proposal.

CHATHAM, Eng. June 27.—An order has been received here for a fleet to mobilize on July 1, preparatory to the annual navy maneuvers.

SARAGOSSA, Spain, June 27.—Many people were injured during the rioting here yesterday. Martial law has been declared at Valencia.

RENEWAL OF A FUED Hostilities Between Baker-Howard Factions are Reopened.

CAPE NOME

Alaska Gold Field Excitement.

Major Ingram of Seattle, Writes.

His Letter Tells of Fabulous Riches Just Discovered

SEATTLE, June 27.—Latest advices from the newly discovered gold fields at Cape Nome, Alaska, are contained in a letter from Ingram, of Seattle, who writes under date of February 2, Major Ingram is the leader of a party of fourteen. Major Ingram writes: "On September 25th six men went to work to test their claims. The aggregate of four day's work was \$1,800. The gold was of good quality and sold at St. Michael, without an assay, for \$16.85 per ounce."

"On account of the lateness of the season and lack of supplies no attempt to reach bedrock was made. The news soon spread to St. Michael and elsewhere and has been a constant arrival of prospectors."

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Eight miners have just reached here from Alaska with \$250,000 as a result of two years' digging within twenty miles of Dawson.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—A call special from Nevada City, California says: Mrs. Norval Douglas, of San Francisco, writes that she has received a letter, saying that her son Harry Douglas, along with 25 other picked miners from various counties of California who left June 2, last year, for Siberia under the leadership of John T. McCall, have perished from privation and cold.

WALLACE CASES.

Judge Overruled Nearly all Matters and Demurrers.

WALLACE, June 27.—This morning the defense has announced that it had no further affidavit objecting to the appointment of Angus Sutherland as clerk, so the court appointed him. In the demurrer case the county commissioners court held that the action was purely statutory, not criminal. Court overruled it in all points except the charges that the bill has been allowed Boyle and Stimpson for unofficial duties.

In the case against Sheriff Young the defense filed motions to quash the citation and information. Court overruled. A demurrer was then filed and overruled. The defense then presented an affidavit, showing the necessity of having Thomas Henry, who is now held by the martial law, as a witness for the defense and asked for a writ of habeas corpus to produce Henry in court. The judge promptly declined.
