The resignation of the ladies from the general committee that was formed from the Grand Army and the Woman's Relief organizations is again published. The chairman of the general committee says there will be no further work done under their organization.

**CITIZENS OF SALEM SHOULD ATTEND THE MASS MEETING TOMORROW.**

All citizens of Salem are urged to attend the meeting at the city hall tomorrow afternoon, at 2 o'clock, for the purpose of making arrangements for properly receiving and welcoming the brave soldiers boys of Co. K, Oregon volunteers, who are now on their way home from Manila.

Remember the time and place. Your help is needed.

As the matter stands there is a meeting called at Grand Army hall Saturday at 2:30 to hear further reports of committees. As all the committees have resigned there will be nothing to report and it is not known what will be done.

It is to be hoped that wise action at the city hall meeting at 2 o'clock will bridge over all difficulties and a harmonious enthusiastic, united effort will eventuate.

It is the feeling of all patriotic and conservative citizens that there is no occasion for anything but good will and for all to pull together to give the volunteers "the best in the box," and the general hope is that the meeting Saturday will demonstrate that all minor differences disappear before the general desire to honor the returning soldiers.
